Everyone will be relieved to welcome better weather now that Spring has come. The first part of the year seemed to be perpetually grey, with overcast skies, which did nothing to lift our spirits. Also, many people found the strong winds frustrating and depressing. Provided one could keep warm, the sharp but dry frosts in previous years gave life more sparkle.

Way back in December, there seemed to be an outbreak of speed limit road signs. It was all very confusing and frequently they seemed pointless. Four months later, as this article is being written, the situation is incomprehensible. At this moment of writing the official, legal signs are the ones that have been in operation for the past few decades. The simple explanation for this confusion is that the council's highway department jumped the gun towards the end of 2015. A thorough review of speed limits had been carried out in 2014 throughout the county, since when there have been various logical improvements elsewhere in Flintshire. However, there were several objections to the revised, lower speed limits in the Halkyn area to the surprise of the highways department, who had already prepared various changes. The proposed new signs therefore had to be covered up with plastic. Possibly, by the time this newsletter is published in June, the mystery will have been clarified and conflicting signs will have been removed. The County Council will announce in the newspapers when the new signs come into force. There may still be a period before the road surface

horizontal signs are removed; it is quite an expensive operation. All speed limits have to be sanctioned by the Welsh Assembly Government. The simple but vital aim of the speed limit is to enhance road safety, though to some of us there seem to be extraordinary inconsistencies. For example when one leaves the 30 mph limit outside Ysgol Rhos Helyg it is theoretically possible to immediately increase speed up to 60 mph up Shones Lane, Berth Ddu. Recently, the highways department carried out a traffic flow survey in Rhes y Cae with a with a view to reducing the present 60 mph limit which operates on every road through the village. Essential speed limits will be implemented there soon.

The dangerous state of many sections of road in the Halkyn and district area is cause for serious concern. For example, in Halkyn between the Village Hall and the old "Central Stores". One of the highway managers, living in our area, is only too well aware of the deplorable road surface conditions but he is severely restricted by a ridiculously low budget.

A perennial problem is becoming worse and causing serious concern. There is a proliferation of motorcycle riding on the common, also mountain bikes and even guad bikes. Not only are these machines dangerous to livestock and people they are illegal (there are some legitimate exceptions for farmers). It is almost impossible for the police or the rangers to catch the offenders. There have been a couple of co-ordinated efforts to tackle the problem in the past. The police do not have sufficient personnel nor the time to make casual visits to the mountain on the chance of apprehending offenders. There is only one course for the public to follow. Each time a motor bike is seen on the mountain this should be reported directly and immediately to the police on the special phone number 101 (NOT 999), specifying as precisely as possible the time and place. Over time a pattern may develop which could enable the police to make an effective move.

Another regular but distasteful subject that concerns many people is that of dog fouling. A sub-committee of the Council's Environmental Scrutiny Group is tackling this serious problem. Other councils in Britain are already preparing to take, or are taking, action to combat this dangerous health hazard. Flintshire is almost ready to introduce bye-laws which will result in punishment for owners of dogs who do not take sufficient care in clearing up, and disposing hygienicaly their dog's mess. This is not a vendetta against dog owners. It is an essential duty to avoid serious health hazards should person, and especially a child, accidentally come in contact with dog dirt.

Earlier this year, several householders were most concerned and agitated when they received an official form from the Crown Estates. I can assure them with authority, that anyone who received such a form concerning 'mineral rights' on their land, that there is no cause for alarm. Direct contact was made with the Crown Estates, who deal with Welsh matters, situated in Coventry. They were most helpful and understanding and sent me explanatory letters, which I was able to give to the individuals who consulted me. I also left copies at the Blue Bell inn, Halkyn. Very simply, the Crown Estates are updating their records from 1858, when the Grosvenor estates transferred their mineral rights to the Crown.

It is a source of great pride and satisfaction that there are so many diverse activities taking place on the mountain, many of which are organized by willing volunteers. Most of these activities will be mentioned in other parts of this journal. May I mention especially the Halkyn library? Please support it as much as possible we are deeply indebted to the Community Council for taking steps to retain it.

Let us hope that the weather will be kind to us on the occasion of the Rhes y Cae and Moel y Crio sheepdog trials and gymkhana at the end of July.

Mention must be made of the Halkyn Heritage week. On Sunday, May 1st there was a "Fossils, Rocks and Minerals walk". In spite of a cold wind and a forbidding, overcast sky, there was a remarkably good turn of out both of adults and children. The younger children showed great enthusiasm and pleasure and their searches provided pieces of fossils, almost perfect calcite formations and good examples of Galena (lead ore).

Once again, sincere thanks must go to our editors and their supporting staff. They voluntarily spend an immense amount of time preparing this journal for publication and, whilst I may be a little biased, I reckon that this local, and free, paper is one of the best of its kind which I have seen. Not only do the editors arrange and check all the material for publication, these poor souls have to extract contributions from reluctant people like myself rather like getting blood out of a stone. In a way it keeps us young; whenever the editor rings me up to remind me of the closing date it carries me back to my schooldays, when a long suffering teacher, with a pained look in his eye, would gently remind me that my essay is long overdue.

Finally, I am sure all our readers will join with me in wishing all those young people who are sitting their GCSEs this year every success and good fortune in their exams.

Residents' Concerns

Over the past few months the Council have received a number of concerns from residents in relation to the following: (a) Pot holes – in various areas including the Pentre Halkyn to Rhes y Cae road – which are particularly dangerous in parts (b) road gulleys full in various locations on housing estates, including Brynford Road, Pentre Halkyn (c) grass and vegetation growing out of control, in particular, on the embankment between Bryn Felin and Bryn Awel in Pentre Halkyn (d) dust from a local quarry in the Pentre Halkyn area (e) complaints in relation to fly tipping and burning of rubbish in The Windmill area.

The Flintshire County Council advise that they are inundated with reports of pot holes within the County, and will inspect the reported pot holes in the Halkyn Community area – whereby they will be graded as to the urgency to repair. The various gullies, grass and vegetation have been attended to by the County. The manager of a local quarry has visited householders in relation to the dust aspect. The Grosvenor Estate have confirmed that they are investigating the illegal fly tipping and burning on the Common in The Windmill.

Reported Criminal and Other Offences to North Wales Police

The Community Councillors have been advised by the North Wales Police of a significant increase in reported criminal and other offences over the past two months, as follows: (1) Anti-social behaviour. Complaints in relation to off road bikes on the

Grosvenor Estate Update

We were delighted to support the Halkyn Heritage Week once again this year. As always, this annual event boasted a calendar full of family friendly activities and guided walks to promote and celebrate Halkyn Common's rich heritage. Congratulations to all at Flintshire County Council's Countryside Service who were involved in organising such a successful event and thanks to everyone who came along to take part.

Going on guided walks, such as those held during the Heritage Week, is a great way to learn about the area and enjoy Halkyn Common safely. The historic and environmental features of Halkyn Common are largely what makes it special, but the terrain does pose certain safety hazards. We always encourage people to consider their personal safety and to respect the local environment when out and about on the Common which most people do.

Thankfully, emergency incidents are exceptionally rare but unfortunately accidents can happen. As part of our Halkyn Management Plan, we have developed an Emergency Incident Plan to make sure that we are fully prepared to respond in the unlikely event of such incidents. We have been working closely with the emergency services through the North Wales Resilience Forum to make sure that our Plan is robust and effective. In early July we will be carrying out a mock emergency scenario on the Common to further test the Plan.

Gorse fires are another hazard on the Common; they can be life threatening and extremely damaging to habitat and wildlife. We were disappointed to hear reports that several fires are believed to have been set deliberately on land between Pentre Halkyn and Brynford. Anyone with information on such crimes is advised to anonymously call Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or contact 101.

On a lighter note, we are looking forward to welcoming Halkyn Cricket Club to Eaton Park for a friendly match against the Estate Team on 16th June. We are very proud of our long association with Halkyn Common and are always keen to continue our relationship with the local community. We are sure that it will be a fun and enjoyable evening - whoever wins!

Graziers News

It was very disappointing not to get the funding from the Aggregates Levy Fund, especially after passing the Board level. The minister found he did not have enough funds to cover all the projects and the decision was taken to fund projects that had not received money from ALFW previously. I have recently had a meeting with Russell Dobbins, who runs ALFW, and he informs me that they did not receive any funding for the April round and is not sure of receiving any in October. It all depends on the ministers appointed after the up coming elections.

However we have not given up.

The owners of the Pet Cemetery are making efforts to raise money for one of the cattle grids.

Together with Flintshire County Council and Natural Resources Wales (NRW) we are putting in a bid to the Rural Development Programme. We are at present putting together an Expression of Interest, with our fingers crossed.

We have managed to do some gorse cutting during February and March but were rather restricted due to the wet weather. We are shortly going to be looking at areas for cutting for the back end of the year and maybe rolling some bracken during the summer months.

In answer to a question from a reader about the work on the mountain being done in conjunction with Chester Zoo:

We are working together with the Halkyn Mountain Ranger, pooling her budget and the Chester Zoo money.

Whilst Rachael is concentrating on pond restoration, bracken control and some cutting back of gorse we are concentrating on cutting back some of the overgrown areas.

The purpose is to create a mosaic of different ages of habitat and protecting the heathland areas enabling the rare plants to flourish, which is mainly why the common has been designated as a SSSI and SAC.

A secondary concern is that in some areas the overgrown gorse is quite near people's property and therefore creates a fire risk.

Mechanical means of controlling the common has become necessary due to the reduction in the numbers of sheep currently grazing the common (about 1000 at present). In the 1990s there were about 4000 and in the early 1980s in excess of 6000.

We are also looking at a fairly isolated area of the common to leave as a "wild area" and will assessing this with NRW and Chester Zoo personnel in the near future.

Aunty Em

Many on the mountain will have known with great fondness Emily Hughes who sadly died on the 29th December 2015, a few days short of her 96th birthday.

Known as Mum, Nain, Hen Nain to close family, Aunty Em by many, and Emily or Aunty Hughes by others, she lived all of her life on the mountain. Born on the 8th January, 1920 to Thomas and Agnes Grosvenor Davies at Penrhwylfa, Brynford, Emily was the youngest of 3 sisters and 2 brothers. Sadly her sister Emma had died aged 7 in 1918 and her mother in 1923 when Emily was only 3.

When she left school Emily worked in service at Llanasa and Tremeirchion. Whilst at the latter she met Glyn Hughes who she married in 1943. They lived very happily together on the mountain at Penllongle, Rosemount and latterly in their bungalow at Pentre Halkyn. Merfyn was born in 1946. During the war Emily was in the catering corps and after she worked at Llys Gwynfrwdd. Sadly she lost Glyn in 2002 and Mervyn in 2011. One might expect these losses together with those in her early life to make Emily hard but this was certainly not the case. She spent her life caring for others.

Anyone who met Emily could not but be impressed by the welcome she would give them. She loved people, particularly children. It was hard to visit her and not be entertained to a cup of tea, cake and come away with some gift. Tell her you were feeling cold and you were likely to find a hot water bottle placed on your lap!

She particularly loved her family, worrying when there were difficulties and celebrating their achievements. Emily was a life long member of the church and loved her country and its language. She had a marvellous memory, was full of anecdotes of times past and present and loved to laugh. Her rare quality to be never boring and always entertaining was demonstrated by the wide age range of friends and visitors that she had.

Always modest and never expecting anything of life Emily would have been astonished by the 70 plus people who travelled the 30 miles to Colwyn Bay Crematorium for her funeral. The weather was splendid as was the singing and the way that Hugh helped us to remember her. One of her last instructions was that people were to be invited back to the bungalow for a cup of tea and a piece of bara brith because not many would turn up! Needless to say this wish was ignored.

Our family was fortunate to have Emily as an important part of our lives for the almost 40 years that we have lived on the mountain. When we needed help she was always there to support us and became a Nain to our children. She was a babysitter who sent Ruth and I out so that she could look after our children, would often bring us a cake and look for chores that she could help with. We have the warmest memories of the times that we spent with Emily, Glyn and Mervyn. Christmas meals at Rosemount were wonderful. It's not surprising to hear that the current owners say that they can still feel the love that existed there.

We were not the only family 'adopted' by the Hughes and I know that many others will remember them with great warmth. Our lives were enriched by Emily and we join with the family in feeling the loss, taking solace in the many happy and loving memories that we can all keep and share.

Regarding Bryn Celin

In the last issue Dot Holden requested information about her father's old house, the following has been sent in response to that query. Eds.

Cat on a hot slate roof - a mishap at Bryn Celyn

I read with interest the request from Mrs Holden in HMN 164 for information about Bryn Celyn. My stay on the mountain dates back only to the early 1970s, so I don't remember the house in its unimproved state, but I can tell Mrs Holden what happened to the bathroom which Inspector Menzies installed for his wife, and which his daughter mentions. Eventually, like all the accretions which nestled round the ground floor of the original cottage, it was demolished, as subsequent owners found it inadequate.

The bathroom was put in a purpose-built lean-to leading off a lobby on the ground floor and had a low slated roof. I don't know whether condensation had rotted the timbers, or whether timber-rationing after WW2, which gave priority to bomb-damage repairs, had led to some unsuitable use of timber but the roof over the bathroom was distinctly wobbly.

To move to the subject of cats, which is more relevant than it may seem. In the later 1970s Bryn Celyn was owned and lived in by Mrs Fran Hanley, a retired publican from Liverpool, with her daughter Peg and a fluctuating but usually plural number of cats. We lived next door and had only one cat - but our cat was large, wild and had respect for no one. The kindest thing that people could say about it was that it was handsome - it was tabby like a wild cat and would sidle up to you purring loudly and try to take a piece out of your arm when your guard was down. It had no respect for next doors' wellmannered cats and chased them mercilessly - and this is where the bathroom comes back into the story. One morning I answered a knock at the door and found Peg looking distraught and saying "Mum says you're to come over - the cat's in the sink!" She looked as if she didn't know whether she was most fazed by me, her mother or the cat - for the cat was indeed in the bathroom sink, and had got there not in the normal way but through a large hole in the roof. The owner of the house, clad in a dressinggown, toothbrush in one hand, and surrounded by broken slates and torching, looked slightly shocked as well she might. It seems that my cat had been chasing hers across the garden, and they had leapt on to the bathroom roof. My cat was bigger and heavier, and had gone straight through.

I spent the afternoon mending the roof and re-slating it.

And that's how I know about Inspector Menzies' bathroom.

In the dilapidated old ward in the hospital, men, women and children of varying ages and degrees of mental illness are all accommodated in one sleeping area and it is very difficult for ward staff to care for patients with privacy and dignity or to provide individualised therapy, particularly for those needing high dependency care.

The aim is to create a centre of excellence and to help develop and expand community mental health services for the people of Kisiizi and beyond.

Hugh is now well on his way through his pilgrimage and his fund stands on 27^{th} April at £2,595.

His aim is £3,000 so just over £400 to go!

Although we had scheduled the Heritage Week for a week later this year to give us the opportunity to take in the Bank Holiday, the weather was poor at the beginning of the week. The hailstorm on the Saturday morning posed challenges for the Celtic re-enactors who were setting up their camp on Moel Y Gaer but they're a hardy pair and were not put off!



Over 50 visited their camp in the morning, both walkers from the Walkabout Flintshire regular walk and those who undertook a more leisurely walk led by archaeologist, Erin Robinson.



During the afternoon families came to visit and had fun learning about Celtic life in a hands on way.



The Family Fossil Hunt on Sunday looked doomed as the weather was cold, damp and dull. However, we were delighted that 28 still turned out. Adults and children had great fun finding fossils, calcite crystals and even a few pieces of galena, under the expert guidance of Councillor Colin Legg and Mike Taylor from Flintshire Countryside Service.



Unfortunately, due to the unseasonably cold weather we were unable to run a couple of the events. Sunday night's Newt Hunt and Bank Holiday Monday's Family Pond Dip had to be called off – let's hope for better luck next year.

On Tuesday evening Cemex hosted a tour at their Pant y Pwll Dwr quarry. A dozen came for the tour and the weather was kind, allowing everyone to experience the size and splendour of this working limestone quarry.

25 people called into Halkyn Village Hall on Wednesday afternoon, bringing interesting articles, maps and photographs for us to scan or just having a chat and a look at our display of old photos. Several people have offered to help organise future Heritage activities, which is really promising. We're sure there's lots more good material out there.

Wednesday evening's industrial heritage walk, led by our local archaeologist, Fiona Gale and Walkabout Flintshire, went well and, on Thursday afternoon. Seventeen people came along to our Wildflower Walk looking for the first signs of spring on the common. Admittedly there weren't too many flowers out due to the preceding cold weather, but the group now definitely knows its spring sandwort from its wild thyme.

By Friday afternoon it was warm and sunny. 18 people enjoyed a gentle walk round Rhes-y-cae, looking at the older buildings. We were fortunate to be joined by Dr Meggen Gondek of Chester University who explained about the survey work her archaeology students had undertaken at the site of one of the engine houses the previous week. Many thanks also to Noel Jones for his fascinating stories about the buildings and earlier residents and to Colin Legg and Peter Jamieson who took us round the chapel and the church. Over a cup of tea afterwards we discussed the idea of developing a village trail and feel there could be potential for doing this for all the villages.



On Monday 9th, 18 people joined archaeologists Graeme Guilbert and Fiona for a walk up Moel y Gaer to hear first hand from Graeme about what he found when he excavated part of the hill fort in 1972 before the reservoir was built.

Overall, despite the unseasonable weather at the start, we felt it was another success and shows that there is plenty of interest in Halkyn's rich heritage. Some families asked if we could organise one in Whit half-term next year so that their children could join in more activities and we would have a better chance of good weather. 

Smoking Causes Back Pain

It is a well-known fact that cigarette smoking is the main cause of several diseases such as chronic respiratory diseases, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), heart diseases, certain types of cancer, as well as premature death. But did you know that smoking could also be the reason for your aching back? A new study conducted by the researchers from Northwestern University in Illinois found that smokers are more prone to chronic back pain compared to nonsmokers. It shows that smoking causes back pain by increasing brain activity that reduces a person's ability to recover quickly from the symptoms. In another study presented at the 2013 Annual Meeting of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS), researchers reviewed the rates of smoking cessation and related pain in more than 6000 patients who are undergoing treatment for spinal disorders. Relevant information on these patients was gathered for a more accurate result, including co-morbid depression, smoking history, and severity of symptoms. The results showed that those participants who stopped smoking reported a significant decrease in their symptoms while those who continued smoking experienced no improvement.

Aside from these two studies, another reason why smoking and back pain are linked is because of the

Senior Snippets: Safety Advice

It's really important to stay healthy and safe at home. Your home is where you should feel most secure and by carrying out a few quick checks you can ensure you are living in a home that is safe as can be.

Prevent falls: Make sure all hallways, stairs and paths are well lit and clear of objects. Make sure to use rails and banisters when going up and down the stairs. To prevent falling over area rugs, secure them to the floor so they do not move, and try not to place any at the bottom or top of stairs. Remember not rush to answer the phone, as many people fall trying to get to answer on time.

Avoid bathroom hazards: Install grab bars in the shower and near the toilet to make getting around easier and safer. Rubber mats in the bathtub will also help prevent slipping.

Prevent poisoning: Never try to heat your home with your stove, oven, or grill. These all can give off carbon monoxide, a gas that you cannot see or smell, but it is deadly. Install carbon monoxide detectors near all bedrooms, and be sure to test the battery and replace it twice a year. Medication should be kept in its original containers and packaging to avoid any mix up. To make sure the labels can be seen easily, it's always good idea to take them in a well-lit room, again to prevent any mix up or misunderstanding.

Stay warm: Safe and efficient heating will help you keep comfortable, which can be preserved by having your gas appliances serviced regularly by a certified professional. Thermometers help ensure that rooms are at a safe temperature.

For living rooms, the recommended temperature is between 18 and 21°C, but in the rest of the house the temperature should not be less than 16°C.


Children's Pages

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
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
