Grosvenor Estate Update

We regularly remind users of Halkyn Common to alert us at the Estate of any noticeable changes to the landscape, particularly relating to mineshaft features. We were very grateful to one local resident who got in touch with us in January to report suspected movement at a shaft at Moel y Crio. This enabled us to further inspect the shaft, which had already been reviewed as part of our mineshaft surveying programme, to establish any potential risk. Our consultants have concluded that it does not pose any immediate danger, but the area has been fenced and will be monitored closely for 12 months.

You may also have noticed that the fence at the Rhes-y-Cae mineshaft has been removed, and the area tidied. The shaft was remediated in 2013 following its collapse and has been closely observed ever since. The ground has remained unchanged for a post remediation period of 3 years, and there is no evidence of instability that would require continued fencing of the feature at this point.

Other news about Rhes-y-Cae is that the former primary school building is now for sale. The building was originally gifted by the Duke of Westminster to the local diocese in the early 1900, but was transferred back to the ownership of Grosvenor Estate in 2014 following its closure. Before it was put on the market, we discussed potential community uses with local representatives, but no suitable use was identified. We will be ring-fencing proceeds from the sale to support community activity.

We're soon to embark on a programme to restore some of the Clwyd Caps which are in a state of disrepair. The Caps are a prominent and historic feature on the Mountain and, crucially, are important safety measures covering potentially dangerous holes. We are nearing the end of a survey of all existing Caps and will be carrying out restoration works over the coming months, subject to the granting of an ecology licence by NRW.

We recognise that the vast majority of people who use Halkyn Common do so respectfully and responsibly. We've had reports, however, of 4x4 vehicles misusing parts of the Common and accessing areas which they should not. This is both dangerous to people and also to the local environment which is protected by Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) designation. Please let us know if you witness any vehicles trespassing, or any other disrespectful or illegal activity - particularly as we get in to lambing season.

Last but not least, may we wish Edwin Christmas who left his role as Estate Director and Agent before Christmas - all the best in his future career. During his 8 years with Grosvenor Estate he has led many positive changes, including the introduction of an improved safety management system for Halkyn Common. This work will continue under the leadership of our Eaton Estate office team.

Ranger Update

It's the time of year when we will start to see lambs appearing across the common and unfortunately this will mean there will be instances of dogs off their leads and worrying sheep again. So I thought I'd look at what constitutes 'worrying' as there seems to be a bit of confusion? A dog doesn't have to be actively chasing the sheep or attacking them to 'worry' them. A sheep does not know that a dog 'only wants to make friends' or 'play with them' or 'that they are fine with sheep they won't chase them'. Just walking or running through a herd chasing the ball you've just thrown can cause a ewe to abort its lamb, or for ewe and lamb to become separated.

If at all possible please avoid walking through a herd of sheep. The law states that on open access land dogs should be kept on a maximum of 2m lead between the 1st March and 31st July due to ground nesting bird breeding season and ALL YEAR ROUND in the presence of livestock. So please be considerate to the other users of the common, especially those whose livelihood is dependent on it.

Another antisocial problem is residents dumping their garden waste onto the common outside the confines of their property, to either rot down or to be burned at a later date. Please don't, the common is not your own personal compost heap or fire site. Use your brown wheelie bin for garden waste, take it to the recycle centre at Greenfield, compost or burn it yourself on your own land, but do not dump it on the common. There have been a number of cases where thoughtless people have put hedge cuttings; ie leylandii, rhododendron and laurel, on the common only for sheep to eat them. These plants are poisonous to sheep and if they don't kill them (which it generally does), can cause permanent liver damage. Dumping even green waste on the common constitutes fly tipping and can be prosecuted as such. The green waste can also affect the SSSI's (Site of Special Scientific Interest) special features by enriching the soil in the vicinity encouraging undesirable species to establish themselves, such as nettles and thistles or even in some cases the plant that has been thrown out will start to grow. So please keep your waste within the boundary of your own property. On a more positive note the ranger service has been working on the schedule of events for the year. I've included mine for Halkyn in this issue, but should you be interested in getting involved in some activities further afield the Events Programme will be printed shortly. I'll leave copies in Halkyn Village Hall and the Blue Bell and I'll always have some in my van should you see me out and about. Alternatively I'm sure it will be available electronically on Flintshire County Council's website. I'd also like to pass on a big thank you to Andy and Gareth at Cemex, who came to our rescue on a cold foggy day at the end of January while I was out on the mountain with some staff members from the Grosvenor Estate. Our minibus got stuck while being turned around, stranding us, so Andy and Gareth came out and picked us up and took us back to the quarry office for a warm and a brew while the minibus was being extricated.

Halkyn Community Council

Visit to Meeting by Halkyn Ranger

The Council Members welcomed Rachel Watson -Halkyn Mountain Ranger to a Council meeting. Matters discussed with Rachael related to a number of issues on the Mountain, but in particular, to the allowing of dogs by their owners to foul in areas which are frequented by residents and visitors. The area around Bellis Pond, was a concern - which now attracts people - where a platform/jetty has been erected. The depositing of general rubbish was also a concern. Concern had also been expressed when shrubbery and branches are cut, they are not removed. Rachel advised that she would have to consult with Flintshire County Council, to ascertain if they were prepared to place red, dog-bins on the mountain. Litter bins on the mountain tend to cause problems. The wind will blow the items held from the bin around the mountain – but this matter should also be discussed with Flintshire County Council. A survey had been carried out to identify dead and dying trees – which had covered the majority of the mountain. Some work had been commenced but large branches are left on site.

Rachel advised that the biggest concern is fly tipping on the mountain. Recently deposited was a microwave, bed mattress, grass cuttings and six bags of soil and rubble – which have occurred over the past few weeks. Rachel further advised that the Grosvenor Estate have a sustainable management expert for the common. There are a number of cattle grids that require renewing. The Graziers have been awarded funding for bio-diversity. The clearing of ponds is up to date, with more project work to be undertaken. The capping of the shaft in Windmill has been completed and the lime kilns are all completed.

Council Members advised Rachel in relation to the following:

(a) a large tree to the side of Och'r Y Bryn was in need of remedial work. Rachel advised that she was aware of the large Oak, which had been discussed with the Grosvenor Estate.

(b) cutting of gorse

(c) signage indicating dropping of litter and dog fouling is an offence. Rachel advised that the area was too large to place signage, but possibly warning signs on the main roads could be erected.

(d) Other concerns advised to Rachel were – a caravan parked opposite the Blue Bell Inn, a motor home and builders rubble near to the pensioners bungalows.

(e) Rachel was advised in relation to the deposit of rubble in the area of the entrance to Fron Farm, Windmill – that had been reported to the Grosvenor Estate some months ago.

Criminal Damage in Halkyn & Anti-Social Behaviour in Pentre Halkyn

The area has a newly appointed PCSO - named Laura Williams - who attended a Community Council meeting recently. Criminal damage to the Red K6 Giles Scott telephone kiosk sited on Halkyn Village Green was discussed with the PCSO. The glass to the telephone box had been smashed. Also the gate to the bus shelter opposite the Parish Hall, had been deliberately pulled off its hinges and broken away from the posts. Following an inspection, it was agreed that a lot of pressure must have been used to cause the damage. Reports of anti-social behaviour in Pentre Halkyn were discussed – with the PCSO advising that patrols in the area will be increased.

Community Charge (Precept) 2017/2018

The Community Council Members' agreed to increase the precept from £47,000, to £49,000 - an increase to a Band D property within the Community of £1.66p a year (13p a month). The lower property bands would pay less per month. The Halkyn Community Council Band D property charge will now be £35.98 a year.

The Council Members agreed to increase the precept by a modest amount for the next financial year. However, the Members are aware that Flintshire County Council are considering further devolvement of services, and the Community Council have to ensure that there are sufficient balances held in reserve - and to also retain the facilities and services they presently provide. During this new financial year the Council have agreed to continue funding the Summer Play Scheme in Pentre Halkyn and Rhosesmor – which has increased from £1,800 last year to £2,618 this year – together with retaining the Halkyn Library at a cost of just over £4,000.00.

IT Training in Halkyn Library

Following requests from a number of Senior Citizens who attend the Friday Library in Halkyn Parish Hall, the Community Council have provided 'IT and Computer training' over a number of weeks with a qualified trainer. The feedback received from the attendees was favourable.

Speed Indication Flashing Lights:

In the last edition of the HMN the non-working of the speed restriction lights on the B5123 road in Rhosesmor was reported. The County Council have advised that the flashing signage will be removed following the decrease in speed limit. The Council has written back to the County Highways, advising that, following complaints from local residents including Councillors, to the many 'Instances of aggressive tailgating and overtaking in dangerous places' which has occurred since the speed reduction. The Community Council have asked the County Council, not to remove the flashing signage, but to alter the flashing image to a more appropriate deterrent aspect.

It is of the utmost importance that any persons who use the existing bus services and wishes to do so in the future complete the short questionnaire or attends the above drop-in meeting to ensure your travel needs are considered as part of this process. Control of Dogs and Dog Fouling on Brynford Common

The Council has been advised that a further two dog waste bins will be provided by Flintshire County Council to be located on the Ffrith Lane area of the common.

Flintshire County Council is in the process of finalizing the provision of new By-laws. The Manager of this service, Mrs. Ruth Cartwright, will be attending the April meeting of the Council to advise members on the details of the By-laws and how enforcement action may be taken in the future.

Best Kept Communities Competition 2017

The Council has been advised that this year's competition will be taking place in June 2017. In past years a number of local residents have helped support the event which has had a big impact on improving the appearance of the community. Setting of Council Precept 2017-18

At the Council meeting held 10th January, 2017 the Council set its precept for 2017-18 at £16,650, being the same level as 2016-17, making the band D property charge £34.91 per annum.

Provision of External Lighting – St. Michael's Church, Brynford

At the January meeting of the Council it was reported that all the formal consents for the next phase of the external lighting project had been granted. Formal instruction has been issued to the Lighting Contractor to complete the works by the end of March 2017.

ibeacon Network Project

The Council has agreed to participate in the above scheme being promoted by Cadwyn Clwyd. The scheme can provide information on the history, heritage or places of interest, walking or cycling routes which can be downloaded via an App. A working group is being formulated to develop the project being led by Lorna Jenna and the pupils of Brynford C.P. Graziers News

We have, for the third year, been allocated funds from Chester Zoo to continue work on the mountain. In addition to cutting gorse we will look at revisiting areas we have previously cut in order to remove the thistles and briars etc. This can be done during the summer months.

We should shortly be hearing some news about the application to the Rural Development Plan Sustainable Management Scheme for funds for further cattle grids. Unfortunately the Aggregates Levy Fund is being stopped from 31st March this year. We did not apply in 2016 as they only had £350,000 to distribute and they wanted to spread it across as many projects as possible, so even if we had applied and been successful it would not have been enough to complete one cattle grid. It is a great shame that this is being stopped as it has been a great asset to communities that have quarries in their areas. Apparently this money was never ring-fenced for this purpose so the Welsh Government can use the money in any way that they wish.

It is still annoying that, after various efforts, people think the common is their playground and think they can do as they like, being seemingly totally ignorant of the laws governing the land and completely ignoring the needs of the people who work on and look after the common. They should know that ignorance of the law is not a defence and if doing anything on the common they have a responsibility to ensure they are complying with the laws and rules applying to the land.

The only rights people have, other than common right holders, is to walk on the common for fresh air and exercise and are allowed to take a dog but the dog must be under control. This means that at any time of year the dog must be on a lead when in the vicinity of farm animals and between March and the end of July must be on a lead at all times. This is not just for the sheep, but also to prevent the disturbance of nesting birds and any other breeding animals. For any other activity written consent must be obtained from Natural Resources Wales and/or Grosvenor Estates.

Halkyn Graziers and Commoners Association

Halkyn Rocks and Minerals

I am a former resident of Halkyn and a trustee with Amgueddfa Cymru - National Museum Wales. I was recently asking about any ongoing work within the museum that relates to the local area. In response I was sent these two fascinating documents by our head of Natural Sciences. Having read them it occurred to me that they would be lovely additions to Halkyn Mountain News – I hope you agree.

Rachel M Hughes, BA Hons, MBA, FInstLM Rocks from the Halkyn area

Amgueddfa Cymru – National Museum Wales (AC-NMW) holds an extensive collection of rocks from northeast Wales including the county of Flintshire. The local geology of the area, including the constituency of Delyn, is dominated by limestones of Carboniferous age and sedimentary rocks forming the North Wales Coalfield. Samples from these rock formations are held in the collections of Amgueddfa Cymru. The local geology made the region extremely important during the 19th century with industries thriving as a result of the local availability of coal, ironstone, limestone, silica and mudstone (for clay and brickmaking).

Amgueddfa Cymru has recently started a project to enhance its collection of building and ornamental stones from the area. Many historic buildings have made use of the good quality local sandstones (such as the Gwespyr Sandstone), as well as importing stone from further afield. Our building stone studies and resultant collection enables stone used in the past to be better matched to that available today to meet current conservation and construction needs. When restoring historic buildings, the sensitive selection of stone can make the resulting work less obtrusive and help restoration merge into the local environment. A small research project has also been initiated to document the use of Halkyn Marble, a very distinct crinoid-rich limestone of Carboniferous age from Halkyn Mountain. Capable of taking a high polish, it was worked as an ornamental stone for church fonts, steps, mantelpieces and pillars etc. from the 19th to mid-20th century. It has been used to great effect at St Mary's Church, Halkyn in the font, pulpit footing and pillars. The stone has been used for decorative work much further afield than Halkyn, and continued research will look at identifying such works.

Minerals from the Halkyn area

Amgueddfa Cymru – National Museum Wales (AC-NMW) holds the David Pennant collection (pre-1820) which was formerly housed at Downing Hall, near Whitford. David, son of the famous Welsh naturalist Thomas Pennant, collected predominantly continental minerals, but some of the



specimens in his collection are from the Halkyn area. AC-NMW holds an extensive suite of minerals from the lead mines at Halkyn. A large proportion of these were collected when the mines were operating during the early 20th century by Griffith John Williams (Assistant Mine Inspector for North Wales and Ireland Division). Included amongst these are purple fluorite cubes from the Bryn-gwiog Lode on Halkyn Mountain, calcite, fluorite, sphalerite and galena from Rhosesmor Mine, and a large suite of calcite crystals from Halkyn Mine. A large collection of fluorite from the Bryn-gwiog Lode was donated by Trevor M. Thomas who published a book on mining in Wales during the 1950 to 1960s. Other acquisitions include 'ruby' sphalerite crystals from Halkyn Mine and fine calcite and fluorite specimens (in the renowned Bob King collection acquired in 1983) are also from Halkyn Mine.

In more recent times suites of mineral specimens have been collected from working quarries (including Pant and Pant-y-pwll Dwr) on Halkyn Mountain as part of the Museum's MINESCAN project in 1999. This work resulted in the discovery of some of the best azurite (copper carbonate) crystals found in Wales.

Can You Help?




Post Office at the Blue

The demand for Post Office Local services is not as good as we would hope to make it viable for the Post Office and it really does need your continued help to keep it open! We are running with about half the business it needs to make it viable, I do not want to lose it but by the support it gets I suspect the Post Office may take a different view. Please do your best to use your Post Offices on the mountain.

Has your bank closed or is it closing soon? We've a full range of free and safe banking services with close, safe parking. Did you know you can withdraw cash or deposit cash and cheques into your bank account here at our branch in the Blue Bell? Come in and see us! Think about your local Post Office before running down to Mold or Holywell for a bank or your holiday money (or travel money cards), doing bill payments, electricity and phone top-ups and do many other things apart from the obvious post and parcels. You don't need to burn up your lunch hour when you can pop in and do your Post Office business on the way home after work or on Sunday night prior to starting your working week. We've a nice warm and cosy atmosphere, without the long queues and some safe parking and we're also open for later hours than many Post Offices, where else could you use your Post Office after 9pm on a Sunday or any other night we're open?

Snippets from Old Newspapers

Flintshire Observer – 25 March 1881 HALKYN SOCIAL ENTERTAINMENT

A very pleasant gathering was held at the schoolroom, Halkyn on Tuesday, the 22nd. The entertainment, which was highly appreciated by the audience, consisted of a magic lantern exhibition kindly provided by Mr. G. Maelor Evans. The main subject was the life and adventures of Robinson Crusoe and as the several pictures appeared, the Rector gave a brief account of them. Mrs A.U.S. Cooper of Springfield, very kindly sang a pretty Scottish song which was encored, and Miss Mansbridge sang one Welsh and two English songs in her usual pleasant manner. Mr Mansbridge also contributed much to the mirth and harmony of the evening, and Miss Astbury of Northop, presided at the pianoforte, and played several pretty pieces as well as the accompaniments of the different singers. The entertainment was altogether so successful, that a general wish was expressed for an early repetition of it.

Rhyl Record & Advertiser – 8 March 1890 CAERFALLWCH

THE DUKE AND ST PAUL'S CHURCH

St. Paul's Church, Caerfallwch, which was built some fifteen years ago, is reported to be in a dangerous condition, the foundations having given way. The Duke of Westminster, during his recent visit to Halkyn Castle, went over and inspected the Church and we hear that he has taken steps to immediately ensure the safety of the building, and place it in secure repair. Mr Douglas, architect of Chester has been over the Church, and it is expected that restorative operations will at once begin. The Vicar, the Rev. Clement Davies, is gradually recovering from his recent dangerous illness.

From Grandma Foster's Recipe Book

Chocolate Biscuits

Pat 1/2 lb floar in a basin with 1/2 teaspoon of baking powder and rab in 4 ozs margarine, then add 3 ozs cocoa, 4 oz sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence and mix to a stiff paste with beaten egg and a little milk.

Roll paste onto a floured board to about 1/4 inch thickness, and stamp out with a fluted cutter into little biscuits. Bake in a moderate oven and when set, but not quite baked, brush over the top with a little milk and sprinkle with desiccated coconut and let them finish baking.

Tomato Sauce

Boil two sliced onions in just enough water to cover them and when they are nearly done, cut up 1/2 doz fine ripe tomatoes and put into a stew pan with an oz of butter, a dessert spoon of salt, and shake of pepper. If tomatoes are scarce, a sharp apple, cut into quarters and seeds taken out, may be added. Let tomatoes simmer for ³/4 hour then rub them through a sieve, the puree, if properly managed, will be as thick as any good apple sauce. Return to the stew pan, with a small piece of butter and let it get thoroughly hot.

Great Great Grandma Ann Elizabeth Foster was born in 1840 and came to live at Rhyd y Crogwydd Farm, Nannerch in the 1880s. Her handwritten recipe book is filled with a wide variety of recipes from fine dining to nourishing food for the farm hands.

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From the Rev'd Hugh Burgess



Dear Friends

Late last year I was surprised to see that Professor Brian Cox had been invited to address the clergy conference of the Diocese of Leeds, one of the largest in the Church of England. During that conference, he was asked why he had agreed to come given the difference of opinion. His

answer was instructive and challenging. In essence, his position is that, while he may profoundly disagree with other people on various topics, we are all human beings occupying the same tiny planet and that, unless we listen to one another with respect we create an increasingly polarised society and this is not healthy for any of us. He speaks of the toxic ghettoization of society (see below*).

Increasingly in society, in the media and particularly on social media we see an intolerance to the views of others. People are demonised because of their different views. In a democratic society, it is entirely right that we challenge those who have different views but we also need to learn to listen to them. Without listening there is no understanding, and without understanding there is only mistrust, fear and eventually hate. Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds, has written recently on the same subject in a blog that is well worth reading (see below**).

What alarms me is that so often the challenge is not to the argument but is a personal attack on the person. To demonise someone who has a different point of view (or even a radically different view of the world) does not strengthen our society and make it a safer place. The "trolling" and vilification of people who stand up and speak for what they believe is an obscenity that should have no place in our society.

As Nick Baines points out, whilst 52% of people voted to leave the EU, 48% did not. The decision of the 52% must be respected in a democratic decision. Equally, however, the views of the 48% cannot simply be ignored and nor should they be vilified when they express their views. By all means, challenge the argument, but respect for the person seems to me to be very important for the future of our society.

In the same vein, it is certainly true that Mr Trump won the election in the USA and whatever we think of him, I think we need to respect that decision. We must also acknowledge that the decisions made since taking office are in line with what he said he would do. However, simply because a politician is able to make a decision, or even that he's been elected on a particular platform, does not mean that those who disagree should simply roll over and accept whatever is done. No one denies the right of the US to control its borders. What is at issue, what has incensed so many people around the world is the way that decision has been implemented. It is not a decision that is based in respect and celebration of difference, or recognising the weak and vulnerable, but appears to be founded in mistrust, hatred and fear. It is certainly not based in evidence. I understand that since 9/11 more than ³/₄ million people have moved into the United States and not one of them has been involved in any act of terrorism. Compare that to deaths from US domestic gun crime. In 2015, for example, more than 13,000 people died in firearms incidents in the US - and that was a pretty typical year. You can make your own judgement!

One of the shocking things about the story of the Good Samaritan for those listening to Jesus was that the man who had been mugged was ignored by those of his own people (the priest and the Levite) who should have known better. The man who came to his aid was a Samaritan, a man who would have been considered his mortal enemy. This is not some namby-pamby liberalism but simply common humanity. While it's much easier to attack those with whom we disagree, I think we need to relearn how to disagree respectfully with others. I believe that this is critical if we are to avoid the further polarisation of our society.

As I have said in previous letters, please do feel free to contact me with any issues or situations that you'd like discuss, you feel I ought to know about or where you would perhaps like some support or encouragement. Please do not assume that I will hear about a situation. I often don't hear until it's too late but I am very keen to help where I possibly can, so please do get in touch. County Councillor

It is a pleasant change to be able to start with some reassuring news: that Ysgol Rhos Helyg has been taken off the list of possible school closures or other changes such as the federation. Actually, closure was unlikely but other changes were possible considerations. The fact that the school is a listed building was a potent factor. At the more westerly end of Halkyn Mountain, Brynford school is likely to experience change: various projects are under consideration but closure is most unlikely. Ysgol Licswm's future is uncertain, which naturally concerns parents and teachers.

One tries hard to avoid contentious issues but the question that is bound to arise is "how did these village schools, many decades ago, manage to educate their pupils without the vast resources and huge amounts of money spent on schools today, and yet achieve good standards?

After almost endless requests, paperwork and other frustration (and some temporary anomalies) all the villages on the Mountain, with the exception of Rhes v Cae, have safer and appropriate speed limits. Hopefully, the flashing speed limit signs at Rhosesmor will be restored. Both Halkyn Community Council and your County Councillor have made the strongest representations to have this done. There is surely a logical need for their restoration. If it was necessary to have a flashing 40 mph speed sign before, one would assume that at 30 mph sign is even more necessary. While speeds of 70 mph are acceptable on motorways and clearways restrictions are essential in even lightly built up areas. Generally, the time saved by excessive speed on short stretches of road is surprisingly small. The County Council highways department did monitor traffic flow in Rhes y Cae towards the end of 2016. So far, no speed limits have materialised. Perhaps there are not sufficient ticks in the 'right' boxes, whereas, commonsense cries out for restrictions on the extended S-bend in the middle of the village with a building jutting out into the highway at the end of lengthy straight stretch.

People will have noticed that there have been welcome improvements to road surfaces in some places and considerable attention to filling in pot-holes and roadside repairs, which is all very commendable. Rather perversely, as fast as retailers are made in one place problems seem to appear elsewhere. With severe financial restrictions it is almost impossible for the council to do all that it would like to do, or even needs to do.

As we approach Spring, may I remind dog owners to be especially careful when walking on the Common. Even well behaved dogs have their moments and it is vital that ewes and lambs are not frightened or harassed. All animals have a value (including dogs) but, to farmers, animals are a source of valuable income. Motorists and cyclists should also take care on the roads. Also, it is also not realised that the attractive vegetation of the Common is largely a result of sheep grazing. There are parts of the Common which have turned into scrubland owing to so many graziers having gone out of business. This trend is likely to continue if more, cheaper meat is imported.

It has come to my notice that some people have experienced difficulty making contact with specific departments at County Hall. I can sympathise with them having had the same problem, but Councillors have one advantage in that they can go into County Hall and can make some kind of contact (provided the person they seek is not in a 'meeting'). The best thing to do is to ring 01352 701235; they wil then be put through to the desired department. This number was published in H.M.News a couple of years ago and is still active today - unless the operator has gone to a meeting! Readers will realise that I am suspicious of 'meetings'.

There is little to report from County Hall at the moment, except to say that quite a number of <u>important</u> meetings have been cancelled recently. Perhaps there is little significance in this, but it is a phenomenon which has seldom occurred previously. What is remarkable is that the number of staff has been cut quite severely (mainly the more experienced staff) but parking has become far more of a problem. Curious!

Very recently I had a very unpleasant experience, from which some of you might benefit. A phone call, purporting to come from a Government department, with plausible and cogent facts and details, turned out to be a fraud. The supposedly confidential 3 digit number on the reverse of my debit card was quoted to me, which immediately aroused my suspicions. I raced to the bank. The staff were most helpful and cancelled my current card and confirmed that no money had been fraudulently taken from my account. They advised me to report the matter to the police, which I did at once. They said they did not initially look into all reports of fraud but gave me the following telephone number to report the matter, 0300 123 2040, or to contact *actionfraud.police.uk* online.

I had written down various details from the original phone call and gave these to the above number, for which they were most grateful. Fortunately, I was lucky and lost nothing but I feel this information may help others in a similar situation.

May I wish everyone a happy and enjoyable Easter and indeed a pleasant and satisfying year.

It seems that my first attempt at contributing to Halkyn Mountain News was well received as I seem to have had more visitors since. I do enjoy visitors and am always pleased to see everyone. Sometimes when I see them coming with gifts of carrots and apples I can't contain my excitement and start running to greet them. I know I may look as if I won't be able to stop before I reach the fence but I have it down to a fine art and can always stop in time.

Although I miss my Mum, Ginnie, I don't get much time to feel lonely as the sheep appear to have adopted me. They are forever calling by to chat and gossip. I find that with the rain, mist, fog and snow in winter I often can't see much beyond my field and stable so I don't get to know so much about what is happening in the world. I have to rely on the sheep and the occasional bird to tell me. I cannot always believe what they say and sometimes they do have an outlook on life that is peculiar to me. They recently spun a tale about a new leader of a herd with strange hair in a distant land who had decided he would stop birds migrating. I can only think one of the sheep must have had a bad dream!

Now that lambs are arriving, there is much



competition amongst the ewes. All the lambs look the same to me but obviously not to their mothers. It is funny when lambs come up to the fence and look at me for the first time. From experience, I know that it's best at first to keep my head down and carry on grazing as, if I look up and smile, the sight of my toothy grin can come as a shock and send the lamb running away bleating. In the past I have been scolded by ewes for scaring their offspring. Perhaps that's why you don't often see sheep smiling. I thought I did see a ewe smile once but I think it was a reaction to what she was doing at the time rather than her smiling at me. Perhaps I am too selfconscious but I always think that sheep naturally look as if they are about to scold me.

Many of the human visitors who come and see me do smile at me. Their teeth are rarely scary and I like it when they smile. They also say nice things, and even if they have only met me a few moments before, tell me what a good donkey I am. I can only assume they must read Halkyn Mountain News otherwise how else would they know?

Visitors often ask me to pose for a photo. I have never known what this meant, but my Mum used to tell me that it meant to stand still for a moment so that they could memorise the beauty of a donkey. I do my best to stand still but it is very difficult especially when they have carrots or apples in their hands. I must be doing it right as they always seem pleased. Bye for now,

We are a small village club that was established over 150 years. Once a thriving club with a plentiful membership the club, like so many other village clubs, over the years has lost both senior and junior members. Our long-term aim is to build up the club membership to where it should be and keep cricket alive on Halkyn mountain. This is not going to be an overnight job but many years of hard work.

We have always played in the North Wales Cricket League and have for a number of years now had teams in the North East Wales Cricket League and have in the past produced players who have played for Wales and North East Wales.

We are an ECB accredited club, which means that we have passed all the necessary criteria set out by the ECB. At present, we have two senior teams and last year had two junior teams but this season numbers are low so we have decided that we need to go back to basics. We need to try and build on the players we have whilst trying to encourage new players.

There is no better way to spend a few hours than

playing or even watching cricket. Initially you might think that it appears boring but once you understand the basic rules it can quickly become addictive and, unlike football, you are not out in the wet weather. It gets people out into the fresh air and children away from the television and game consoles for a few hours.

We run weekly nets sessions for both the senior players and the junior players at the club ground.

Where the junior section is concerned, we are not a win at all costs club and believe that the first step should be enjoyment and an understanding of the game. For this coming season, we have enrolled in the ECB's All Stars Cricket which is targeted at the 5-8 year olds as an introduction before they get to the under 9 age groups where they will then enter the league and play soft ball cricket against other clubs on a friendly basis. Then, at under 11 age groups, they will play hard ball cricket in a league. All protective equipment is provided.

We have indoor nets sessions on 12th & 26th February and 12th & 26th March at Mold Sports Centre 11am til 12pm. All coaching sessions are run by fully ECB qualified coaches and all helpers have undertaken a DBS certificate.

We are hoping to hold a taster session day in early Spring. We also have a Facebook Group (please like it) and a website so please keep your eyes open, all information will be posted on there.

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
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
