Saturday afternoon 25th July was a tonic for everyone on the field at the Rhes y Cae and Moel y Crio Annual Sheepdog Trials. The sun was shining though the morning had seemed doubtful. People were happy and contented, renewing old acquaintances, and there was a buzz of excitement and activity. We owe a great debt of gratitude to Mr Brian Colclough and his band of voluntary helpers for making this an occasion of which Rhes y Cae should be proud. An immense amount of thought and hard work goes into preparing for this event. Other villages on the Mountain can equally be proud of various activities and achievements. Although Rhes y Cae has lost its school, post office and bakehouse, there still remains a vitality in the village for which we should be grateful.

July has been very disappointing, it has been unusually cold and wet. People have admitted to turning their heating on or lighting fires. An incessant wind, quite biting at times, has added to the unpleasantness of the weather. Too much should not be read into this feature of our weather. Almost 200 years ago Britain experienced the "Year Without a Summer" (1816). For many the results were disastrous, failure of the harvest, hunger and disease, all exacerbated by large numbers of soldiers seeking employment after the end of the Napoleonic Wars. There have been several instances since then, even in our own time, but not so devastating.

There is no doubt that global warming is taking place, but some people who should know better (especially Hollywood film makers) exaggerate and distort the possible consequences. It does anger me when 'climate change' and 'global warming' are wrongly used as alternatives for the same weather feature. Global warming is one factor in climate change, but we must remember that climate change has existed for millions of years. Our daily weather has a real and immediate impact on us. However, the precision and accuracy of weather recording is a fairly recent scientific advance. For weather roughly prior to 1850 we have to rely on writers like Gilbert White of Selbourne, and going even further back to the manuscripts written by observant monks in the monasteries.

I am only writing this in a local publication to try to allay the anxieties which some folk have because of the alarmist, and frequently inaccurate, forecasts of some of the Press, whose knowledge is either minimal or incorrect. The trouble is that what they write makes good 'copy' in newspapers or popular scientific journals.

A more serious and local concern is the question of local government reorganization. Several questions arise:

- Is it really necessary to have a major reorganization? This is the third in nearly 40 years. Lord Faulkner once said, "If it is not necessary to change, it is necessary NOT to change."
- 2. How much will it cost? Very seldom are projections of costs for future plans accurate. Frequently the actual costs exceed the original prediction by 10, 20 or even 50 per cent or more.
- 3. If previous reorganisations have not been successful, what guarantee have we, as council-tax payers, that

yet another reorganisation, with all its accompanying problems, confusion and expense, will be the final perfect conclusion? There is very considerable opposition in council, across all parties, to these unacceptable proposals.

 If there is over-staffing and duplication at the moment, which is now doubtful, surely the councillors themselves can make the necessary reductions. Also the five councils in North Wales are already working in collaboration, e.g. waste disposal.

It is claimed that £150 million will be saved, which is approximately £7 million pounds per council, a large sum, but how much will the costs of reorganisation be?

An even more serious problem, affecting many parents and children in our area, has arisen recently: school reorganisation and 'modernisation'. It was quite a bombshell when it was announced that several Flintshire schools, possibly as many as 16 in the county, would be considered for closure or amalgamation. Brynford, Lixwm and Ysgol Rhos Helyg are on the list. More imminent closure faces Flint Mountain and Llanfynydd primary schools which is being vigorously, opposed by parents, governors and staff.

It is still a better reflection for me that Ysgol Rhes y Cae was closed a couple of years ago, despite the wholehearted and desperate opposition of the local community. It is therefore almost impossible for me to consider the present alarming situation objectively and without bias. I will again do all I can to help schools under threat, as will many other councillors. In fact a considerable number of the Education Committee (LLDSC) are against closures, but the official policy seems to be set in concrete. Although there is a clear and legal procedure to be used, which the education department will follow meticulously, all the discussions and consultations are really a sop to give the impression that local feelings and wishes are considered. However, there seems to be a hidden agenda to close the smaller schools, no matter how good they are, and the fight to save these vital assets in our villages is almost impossible to win.

The root of the problem is money. Social values, which cannot be quantified, are not considered. Local village schools are essential for the welfare and life of rural communities. Sadly it will be left to social historians, well into the future, to judge and assess the damage done to our communities.

On a more cheerful note, as can be seen in this edition of the Halkyn Mountain News, all the villages are active in various ways. The regular film shows projected in Halkyn Cricket Club, and an interesting range of dance classes are but a few of the social opportunities in the area and, most importantly, please make the fullest use of your local library in Halkyn Village Hall. Public libraries are also on the 'hit list' in this superficial economy drive.

I wish you all a very a pleasant Autumn, and trust that we have some really good weather to enable us to prepare for winter.

Halkyn Community Council

New Chair and Vice Chair of Halkyn Council Councillor Mrs. Delyth Jones-Taylor was appointed as Chair of Halkyn Community Council, for the ensuing year - 2015/16. Councillor Mrs. Jones-Taylor represents the Rhosesmor Ward of the Council area. Councillor Mrs. Jones-Taylor thanked Councillor Mrs. Wendy Sigsworth, for her previous two years as Chair of the Council. Councillor David Hughes, from Pentre Halkyn was appointed as Vice Chair.

Visit by Natural Resources Wales Representative

Ms. Bethan Beech (Natural Resources Wales - Team Leader Protected Sites NE Wales), was welcomed to a recent meeting of the Council. Ms. Beech explained that in 2002 the Mountain became a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), and further related to the historical aspect, including the limestone. The mountain is very gorse dominated. The Halkyn Graziers Association has been awarded £3,000 by Chester Zoo, to assist with work on the mountain. Ms. Beech further advised that NRW wished to consult with the residents of the community, to ensure that they are aware of the issues faced on the mountain, together with the plans of NRW for the future of the mountain. Councillor Howard Morris stated: that the management of the mountain had changed enormously over the past few years. Ms. Beech replied, agreeing that the mountain did require more management, and whilst the area will be gorse dominated, there are many other plants on the mountain that require more space. The Councillors suggested the following ways to reach out to the residents: Halkyn Mountain News article and/or leaflet; attendance at the craft fairs held at the Halkyn Parish Hall; contacting the various local groups.

Community Street Lighting - Repair & Maintenance Many residents will be aware that there have been a number of street lights out of order for many, many months. The Community Council have recently completed a tendering exercise, and have subsequently appointed the Flintshire County Council, Street Lighting Department, as the Council's street lighting repair and maintenance contractor. Out of the 15 outstanding faults 10 were repaired within one week. The outstanding 5 faults relate to a new lamp in Pentre Road, Pentre Halkyn (following the demolition of the lamp by an unknown vehicle), together with 4 lamps awaiting parts - including the lamp on Halkyn Village Green area.

Halkyn Council Cemetery - St. Mary's Church The Halkyn Community Council have agreed to enhance the Council owned Cemetery adjacent to St. Mary's Church in Halkyn, and over the next few years many thousands of pounds will be spent on this work as follows:

- a. The Council have accepted a quotation from a local contractor to remove the soil that had been deposited around the edges of the cemetery by grave diggers employed by a number of local Funeral Directors. In particular, the far right hand side of the cemetery where the soil blocked a culvert drain. This work has now been completed, and resulted in over 70 tonnes of soil being removed.
- b. The next stage of the project will be to return the

Cemetery to a 'Lawned Cemetery' in keeping with the Cemetery Rules and Regulations. Visitors to the Cemetery will have noticed that a number of graves have sunk, whilst other have not, which has resulted in a number of graves with humps. During this second stage, the soil on the first row of graves (nearest the wall to the St. Mary's Church cemetery) humped graves will be skimmed and the soil spread on the dropped graves. The whole row will then be flat and subsequently re-turfed. Any flowers on the graves will be removed to the back of the graves, and placed back following the completion of the work. The Council will complete this work in stages. It is not possible at this time, to estimate the length of time for the work to be completed.

c. Whilst there will be a notice displayed in the cemetery advising of the work to be carried out, it is not possible to write to the holders of Exclusive Rights. In particular, as the first burial was in January 1993, and many of the original Exclusive Rights holders will no longer be the actual holder. Should anyone wish to discuss the work to be carried out at the Cemetery, please contact myself, as Clerk to the Council - details below.

Review of Subsidised Bus Services

The Flintshire County Council held recently in County Hall, Mold, a 'Community Transport and Public Transport Workshop' The presentation advised in relation to the lesser funding being received each year from the Welsh Assembly and wished the delegates in attendance to discuss various options to continue with core bus routes. One suggested core bus route would run along the A541 Mold to Denbigh, which is presently funded by both Flintshire and Denbighshire County Councils. If agreed, the bus would travel along the A541, would not deviate off the A541 to the various villages, including Rhosesmor, Halkyn and Pentre Halkyn - there would be 'hub' bus stops along the route, for instance, a hub in Rhydymwyn. The County Council were suggesting that volunteers provide transport from Rhosesmor, Halkyn & Pentre Halkyn, to meet the A541 service in Rhydymwyn. A similar 'hub' would be established in Holywell. The County emphasised that there would be funding for start-up costs, the changeover would be a phased approach. The County will hold further workshops in the future.

Flintshire Considers Development

Flintshire County Council has made available a huge amount of information relating to the thoughts and criteria concerning the Local Development Plan (LDP) for the county.

'First look' list of possible development sites

The Council has compiled a Register of submitted Candidate Sites, which is available to view in hard copy at Council Offices in Mold and Flint, at Contacts Centres and at libraries. It can also be accessed on a computer by entering the following into the address bar of an Internet browser:

http://www.flintshire.gov.uk/en/Resident/Planning/ Candidate-Sites-Register.aspx

The page that opens, entitled Candidate Sites Register, provides a link to a map showing sites which have been considered for possible development. Alternatively, the details for each settlement in the

county can be accessed from a list on the lower part of the page. Click on a settlement in the list to see the submitted Candidate Sites in that settlement. For each settlement a document will open up containing a schedule for each site, containing key information about the site and a plan showing the site boundary.

The Register is being made available for information only

If, following assessment of submitted sites, a particular site was to be included in the LDP then there will be an opportunity for representations to be made when the Plan is formally consulted upon later in the process.

You should find that each of the district councils has already made an initial response to these lists - note that inclusion in a plan does not mean development is likely, but residents might want to contact their councillors if they want to make initial arguments against specific sites.

While contacting councillors is fine, formal responses to Flintshire County Council will not be accepted - such representations can only be made when a site has been included in the forthcoming Local Development Plan.

I must admit to being very disappointed, despite requests from myself, Grosvenor Estates and our County Councilor which appeared in the spring edition of this publication, we are still losing sheep to dog attacks.

There have been a number of such instances this summer across Wales and at least one dog has been shot. A report in the Daily Post stated that the police are no longer going to take a softly-softly approach to this problem. If you have any problems with sheep worrying contact SCCH 3405 Carol Richards on 07880 156948. NRW intend to try to get a section 15 agreement again. I assume it will not be like the last one. I will try to keep you all informed of what they are proposing as and when they tell me.

Chester Zoo fund.

We will resume work on the mountain in mid September. I will shortly be visiting, with Cerios Davies, those who have shown an interest to sort out consents. There is a chance of further funding from Welsh Government. I have sent the information they required and am now waiting to hear from them.

Scab Prevention Measures

As is normal practice the mountain must be cleared of **ALL** sheep on **Sunday 16th September between the hours of 10am and 2pm.** The sheep are to be returned to the mountain **ONLY** after they have been dipped in a scab approved dip or had an approved injection. If using a dip, then the best advice from DEFRA is that the sheep should remain immersed for at least 1 minute to allow the liquid to penetrate the skin. Spraying is not considered to be effective against scab.

The association would be pleased to receive the cooperation of all the graziers. It is to all our advantage that sheep remain in a healthy, disease free condition.

At home, many different exciting technologies and services are competing for our attention – whether it's on demand TV, shopping for the best deals, gaming with people all over the globe or video chats with friends. The lists of things you can do is almost endless.

As you have moved about the county recently, you could not have helped seeing the teams from Openreach working to bring the network across the county. It is no straightforward task and requires a lot of careful planning, co-ordination and execution to ensure a community can benefit.

Grosvenor Estate Update

Grosvenor Estate regularly carries out improvement and safety works on Halkyn Common to make sure that local people and visitors can continue to enjoy using the land and do so safely.

Over the coming weeks, commencing on the 10th of August, we will be fencing the disused Pen yr Henblas quarry. This work will be carried out by Three Shires Ltd, which is a trusted contractor of Grosvenor Estate. Grosvenor Estate and Three Shires Ltd will be working with Natural Resources Wales and the Halkyn Mountain ranger to complete the work to a high standard. There will be access points on well trodden paths for personnel and sheep access points for grazing sheep along the fence line.

As some readers may be aware, two large gorse fires broke out on Halkyn Common during June. These fires affected about 200 square meters of gorse. North Wales Fire and Rescue Service say they have been inundated with such incidents following the recent dry spell. We kindly ask everyone to be extra vigilant during the summer months, and take particular care not to accidentally cause fires on the Common.

We are disappointed to report that there has been a recent increase in fly tipping on Halkyn Common. Clearing this illegal litter often falls upon us at Grosvenor Estate in conjunction with the Halkyn Mountain. If anyone sees such activity please inform us or Flintshire County Council so that we can address the issue promptly and effectively. We appreciate that it is only a small minority of people who disrespect the landscape in this way, and are thankful for you in the communities around Halkyn for your ongoing cooperation in identifying and tackling this problem.

Gravestones – Halkyn, Rhosesmor and Rhes y Cae



Every few months we check gravestones in the Churchyards to ensure that they are safe. Unfortunately a number of stones in Halkyn have proved to be unsafe and a number have already had to been

laid flat. There are a number of other stones (19 in total) that are considered to be dangerous. These have been labelled and black and yellow tape attached. These will be laid flat in the next two to three weeks. Similar work will be done in Rhosesmor and Rhes y Cae.

The recent death of a child in a Glasgow cemetery reinforces the importance of ensuring that stones are safe.

The Church is responsible for ensuring safety but not for any remedial action to stabilise the stone. This is the responsibility of the owners of the stone who are normally the family. Any remedial action that the family arranges would need to be in line with current legislation and therefore should be undertaken by a qualified monumental mason after consultation with me.

The Three Causes of Spinal Pain

What causes spinal pain?

While there are some people who experience only mild, short-term spinal pain, which can be relieved by rest and lifestyle modification, there are also some individuals who suffer from chronic, long-term symptoms. Spinal pain, if severe, can be very debilitating such that it can affect an individual's day-today activities, as it causes a lot of discomfort and limits the range of motion. Like other types of pain, spinal pain can have a multitude of causes.

Muscular

This is caused by injuries or strains to the ligaments and muscles, especially to the lower back. Possible causes of this would be sports and/or sudden increase in an individual's physical activities. Viral illnesses such as flu can also cause spinal irritation, which often includes the neck and back. This is called myalgia.

Degenerative Changes

In order to form a strong, yet flexible structure, the spine is composed of vertebrae, connected by intervertebral discs, joints, as well as ligaments. As we age, we experience spinal degenerative changes. One of the most common causes of these changes during the middle age (aside from muscular pain), is wear and tear of the intervertebral discs. Wear and tear is a result of repetitive, strenuous movement, and often occurs in the cervical region (neck) and/or the lower lumbar spine. Even though the spine is a biological structure, ageing affects its ability to repair or heal itself because along with ageing, bone spurs and disc bulges develop.

Injuries

Spinal pain may be a result of some type of fracture or trauma to the spine. Most people assume that their problem is caused by an accident, whether it be a sports-related accident, work-related, or even those that occur at home. However, it is important to note that these accidents, in many cases, are purely the trigger of the degenerative problem an individual already has. Another type of injury that produces spinal symptoms is whiplash. This is an injury to the neck caused by a motor vehicle accident. Patients commonly experience a whiplash injury when their vehicle gets rear ended. Manual labour, which includes repetitive bending and heavy lifting, is also said to cause spinal symptoms. Typically, in spinal pain cases, either medication or surgery is suggested, but for those who prefer nonsurgical treatment, chiropractic manipulation is an excellent option. Glan yr Afon Inn



The Glan yr Afon Inn was purchased in December 2012 by Chris and Karen Wright from Pentre Halkyn. Although we had previous business interests in the area, Merseyside and North Wales Fencing, we had never dreamed of buying a pub. We saw the Glan yr Afon was closed down and wanted to bring it back to life. This was a new, challenging venture for us, some might call it a mid life crisis!

We purchased an 8 seater minibus and registered as a taxi with Flintshire Council. This is available mainly at weekends and ensures that you can relax on your evening out knowing you can get back home at the end of the night.

We started with redecoration and made some small changes to the bar and restaurant. The seven en-suite letting bedrooms were in good condition and slowly we started getting guests to stay. As the rooms became busier, mainly with contractors from Gwynt y Mor, we refurbished the remaining rooms upstairs and created a further four en-suite bedrooms. Again we became full to capacity so looked to change the seldom used function room. This created a further three rooms making a total of fourteen rooms. Although we lost our function room we can still cater for small parties in the restaurant. The contractors we had staying were long term and it was an entertaining and enjoyable time for ourselves and the staff. Some of the contractors were due to be leaving in Spring 2014 so we contacted Visit Wales and were assessed by them and achieved a 3* status, so now we have a mixture of contractors and holidaymakers staying at the Glan yr Afon.

Our restaurant is open every lunchtime and evening. On Sunday we open from 12 until 8pm serving Sunday roast, all day if it lasts that long! Head Chef, Tim Wilkes, also has a selection of weekly specials available to tempt you. It is advisable to book first. The bar serves real ale and one of our bestsellers is Facers Flintshire Bitter which as the name suggests is brewed in Flint.

During our time in the Glan yr Afon we have held various fundraising activities, our next one will be Halloween Party on 31st October with all money raised going to North Clwyd Animal Rescue.

It is lovely to see the tremendous support from local people who have helped put The Glan back on the map.

Annual Church Walk in "Thomas Pennant Country" Saturday 23rd May at 10.30am



We were very fortunate with the weather – a lovely morning with no wind! We went to Whitford church and Paul Brighton (Secretary of Thomas Pennant Society) gave us a very interesting short talk on the life of Thomas Pennant (1726 – 1798). Pennant was a travel writer and zoologist (he took a great interest in wildlife) and was born in Downing Hall near Whitford. He travelled the country either walking or on horseback. Then, Frances Taylor (churchwarden) gave us an insight concerning the people of Mostyn Hall. John Thomas took the walking group (about 22 of us) to see Moses Griffith's grave. He was an illustrator for Thomas Pennant. Pennant was possibly buried near the organ in Whitford church.

We went on a nice leisurely walk via Pennsylvania Lodge across lovely countryside. So many beautiful wildflowers to see, especially the bluebells in a small wood. We could see the Pharos on the hillside. Pharos is a round stone structure, reputedly a Roman lighthouse built to help ships navigating up and down the Dee Estuary; possibly a 17th century watchtower built to give warning of pirate raids!

We walked through farmland with many curious brown cows – no problem! Then back on the road to Whitford where John Davidson, Peter Jamieson and Roy Newhouse saw a young sheep tied up in wire fencing. They managed to rescue her without any injury – what a relief!

Then we took our cars and travelled to Maen Achwyfan near Sarn – a carved Celtic cross from the 10th century. To this day pilgrims still visit on their way to Bardsey Island (Lleyn Peninsula).



It is maintained by Cadw, and well worth a visit. Further information to be found in the "Rural Walks in Flintshire" booklet in our local libraries.

Then we proceeded to the Masonic Hall at Rhewl near

Rhydymwyn August, 2015 Dear Friends

Recently there was significant disruption in Calais as the result of people trying to get into the Channel Tunnel terminal. Many gallons of ink were used writing about every conceivable aspect of the break-in but nowhere did I see

anything about the individual people who were trying to get to this country. There may have been coverage but, if so, I'm afraid that I missed it.

One of the things that frequently strikes me about "The News" is the way that the Press - and I suppose therefore, the "General Public"- loves a demon. Included in the current list of demons seem to be refugees, asylum seekers and migrants of all kinds as well as "benefit cheats" and people involved in criminal activity of various kinds. Some of these groups are, I suppose, more understandable than others, but it seems to me that it's very easy for us to group people together and to talk as though every asylum seeker, refugee, benefit claimant or indeed criminal is the same. The language used and the ideas expressed can become quite inflammatory. However, if we always categorise people and speak in this way, we are in danger, I think, of losing sight of the fact that every group is made up of individuals and we risk dehumanising both them and ourselves.

In every society there are those who come up against the law and even at the individual level it is very easy to demonise them, too. I am aware of young men, for example, in our own communities who have got into fights or taken property that doesn't belong to them as well as more serious offences of one kind or another. The courts clearly deal with the offence and that is entirely right and proper, but how do we deal with the individual involved? Do we demonise them and punish them further? How do we deal with their families? Do we assume that the family is guilty by association?

There is an old saying that we should "love the sinner and hate the sin" which we might translate into more everyday-speak as "see the person as different from their behaviour or action".

This is hard, I know, but the ability to see beyond a person's actions and behaviour and to recognise the human being underneath is, I think, an important part of building a healthy community. This is not to condone anti-social activity or criminal behaviour but for those who admit their offence, take their punishment and who seek to make redress we do, I think, need to extend both a certain amount of forgiveness and to recognise that underneath there may be a weak and vulnerable human being who has made what might be a very serious mistake. Loving the sinner and hating the sin is certainly not an easy path but is, I feel, a far more healthy path than creating demons and monsters in our communities.

Gosh – that was all a bit heavy! On a (much) lighter note, I have been delighted to watch the changes

happening in Rhosesmor where a number of people have begun an initiative to strengthen the community. It is exciting to see the new Parent and Toddler group and the Floristry Workshop, as well as other initiatives, getting underway. This is really exciting and I look forward to hearing about other developments as they get underway. As you probably gather, I find anything to do with the growth of "community" exciting and these initiatives, which have come about because a few people thought it would be a good idea to see what people want and need, are really encouraging. Perhaps the stories that come out of Rhosesmor in the next few months might encourage you to start, or get involved, in new community initiatives.

Some months ago, we had cause to take down a tree in the churchyard in Rhes y Cae. I know this upset a number of people. Unfortunately no-one spoke to me directly about this but I'd like to reassure people that this is NOT something that we did lightly or on a whim. In this case professional advice was that the tree needed to be removed for Health and Safety reasons and so we obtained permission through the Church Authorities (in this case the Archdeacon of St Asaph) and the tree was taken down. We do not have a general policy of removing trees if it can be avoided. I would like to repeat my appeal that if you have an issue with the Church in any of the parishes, you write or call me to discuss it. This is so much easier than hearing concerns through the grapevine.


competitive, fun and of course feature good food. The results of these are:




