Halkyn Community Library

The following message is from Councillor Bob Robinson: I wish to update you all on the results of the public meeting held on the 13th January. But firstly, to the attendees at the meeting; another big 'thank you' for attending in such atrocious weather.

In response to such substantial and unanimous public support, the Community Council meeting held the following week after the public meeting had no hesitation in deciding to take over running of the library from Flintshire County Council. We have until July to do so.

I am pleased to be asked to coordinate the process on behalf of the Community Council and have started to contact the various agencies. At this moment it is not clear how much voluntary input will be required, but we would be grateful if anyone would reiterate or advise of your willingness to contribute.

I would also be happy to receive any suggestions whatsoever which might give us ideas as to how to get the best out of the changeover. Also, any suggestions regarding potential funding or possible peripheral activities would be welcome. I can be contacted via the Clerk's e-mail address – as below, or

Community Charge (Precept) 2016/2017

The Community Council Members agreed to increase the precept from £45,000.00, to £47,000.00 (4.44%) an increase to a band D property within the community of £1.19p a year (3.59%) (9p a month)). The lower property bands would pay less per month. The Halkyn Community Council band D property charge, will now be £34.32. When increasing the precept, the Councillors considered many aspects, including extra grass cutting (due to the decrease of services presently provided by Flintshire County Council). To also ensure that the area retains the present facilities and services, including the last 'rural library service' in Flintshire. Additional funding this financial year has been utilised to complete various maintenance works and re-lettering on the Halkyn and Rhosesmor War Memorials, at a cost of £1,400, together with over £2,500 part funding a new bus shelter with the Grosvenor Estate.

Halkyn County Councillor

For some of us, three months can be a very long time; for others, it only seems a couple of weeks ago that the winter issue of Halkyn Mountain News was being compiled and now, once again, some of us are racking our brains to write an interesting article for our local news magazine. We all owe a great debt of gratitude to our editorial team for all the considerable time and thought that they give, freely, to provide us once a quarter with a local paper of a very high standard.

November 11th is always too late for a mention in the winter edition, But I want to say how much the Halkyn branch of the Royal British Legion is grateful for the heartwarming support which the people of Halkyn and district showed on Remembrance Sunday; and for their generosity to the Poppy Appeal. Sadly, the death of our well respected and popular President, Mr. Roberts, occurred earlier on, after a painful illness. Our kindest thoughts go to his wife and family on their sad loss. The British Legion also has been deprived of a worthy President.

There has been an "outbreak" of new Highway Speed Limit signs across the Mountain, which hopefully should make the roads safer. The positioning of some has caused "raised eyebrows", but basically it has been a worthwhile project. The Flintshire highways department has to follow very stringent rules, which at times are paradoxical. For some extraordinary reason Rhes y Cae he has been omitted from this road safety exercise but I am hoping that my protestations at this anomaly will soon be rectified and that the route through the village will cease to be a practice track for Silverstone!

May I remind readers that lambing time is very near. It is vital to keep all dogs on leads. This may seem to be a very strict rule but apart from the totally unnecessary injury and pain to the young lambs, these creatures are part of some people's livelihoods. Flintshire is hoping, in the not too distant future, to introduce compulsory DNA testing for dogs, so that owners of dogs which attack sheep and those which foul public areas can be identified. A couple of local authorities have already done this and the Council is awaiting advice and recommendations from them.

Budget time is rapidly approaching, both nationally and locally. One tries to avoid undue pessimism. The outlook is not good. There has been almost impossible pressure put on local government, not only in Flintshire but in other local government areas as well. The professional officials at County Hall as well as a group of councilors who are knowledgeable and experienced in financial matters have striven to produce the least damaging budget. There is one bone of contention on which councilors of all shades of opinion were agreed, the value of each individual in a specific area. For some extraordinary reason which I cannot understand, each individual in Flintshire is worth less than an individual in some of the South Wales local government areas. Therefore, Flintshire receives less from the Welsh Assembly for running the county than do some of the other councils.

Our local casualty is the Halkyn library. It was most encouraging to see so many people attend a special meeting arranged by Halkyn Community Council to discuss the closure of this vital service. More details will be found elsewhere in this paper. The local library will remain as an invaluable asset for the community, thanks to the support of Halkyn Community Council and the body of local volunteers who are determined to keep the library open, for which we should all be very grateful.

Much depends on the results of the forthcoming elections for the Welsh Assembly. One factor which concerns us all in many ways is the future of Flintshire: will it remain as an independent council or will it become part of something much bigger - and more remote? At the most recent County Council meeting I made a carefully considered but passionate plea for Flintshire to maintain its identity. In fact, most councilors agree. I do believe that in some areas of local government it would be advantageous to work with other councils, but basically we need to retain our own unique identity. Even if the plans for much larger local government areas come to fruition, the Welsh Assembly would still create committees for special areas - like smaller counties. Two questions remain unanswered. First, why was Clwyd dismantled in 1995, in favour of the smaller but efficient and democratic counties? Secondly, what guarantee is there that after 20 years or so that local government will not again be reinitiated because the much larger communities are inefficient or too bureaucratic? My apologies, another question: how much will such a massive rearrangement costs us, the local ratepayers?

In spite of so much uncertainty, austerity and very disappointing weather, may I wish you all a pleasant and promising Spring.

Brynford Community Council

Following a number of enquiries as to the purpose and history of the sculptures erected on Brynford Village Green, the Council has commissioned the services of a local historian to design bilingual, interpretation display panels. The panels will dictate the history of the common and relate to sculptures of the quarry men erected on the village green.

Proposed Cattle Grids, Brynford

The Council has been advised by Mr. G. Williams, Secretary to Halkyn Graziers and Commoners Association, that a financial application to the Aggregates Levy for the provision of 2 cattle grids; 1 at the top of Brynford Hill and 1 Lixwm side of Brynford C.P. School had been approved. The financial grant provides for up to 75% funding for the scheme. Mr. Williams further advised that his Association was writing to other partners in an effort to seek financial support for the remaining 25% of the project costs. Flintshire County Council was in the process of obtaining Tendered Costing for the project and upon receipt of the full project costs and funds raised the Council has agreed to support the project financially.

Setting of Precept for the Financial Year 2016/17

At the January meeting the Council considered its financial budgets for expenditure for 2016/17. The Council agrees its budget requirements in order the Council's services and projects can be funded. For the year 2016/17 the precept was unchanged remaining the same level as 2015/16 at £35.00 per year for a band "D" valued property.

Graziers News

Good news We have been awarded funding of £3,000 from Chester Zoo for the second year so we will be able to continue our work on the common. If there are any further requests for areas to be cut please contact the secretary on 01352 780008 so that the necessary consents can be arranged with NRW.

The Aggregates Levy Board has passed our bid for funding of the two cattle grids in Brynford. This has now been passed to the Welsh Government Minister for final assessment. We should hear if we have been successful early in February.

As the above fund will only cover 75% of the cost we have had to look for the remainder from elsewhere. Organizations that are going to contribute are Brynford Community Council, Grosvenor Estates and Natural Resources Wales. In order to receive the contribution from NRW they want us to sign a section 15 agreement and as at the present time we do not know what this will entail we are looking for another source for this funding.

We have inspected the areas where Scottish Power have been working this summer and found very little disturbance to the sward on the common which is a vast improvement on the work carried out in late 2014 and early 2015. In one area they removed an overhead line completely by hand, no machinery was used.

There is a project starting on hedge laying/cutting called the Long Forest Project - Hedges in Flintshire. The work is to include planting new hedges, repairing gappy hedges and hedge laying. Any one who is interested contact Steve Bromley at steve.bromley@keepwalestidy.org or phone 07964 118914.

It is noticeable that there are a number of activities being carried out on the common. Please note that as per the CRoW act people are only allowed to walk on the common for fresh air and exercise and the only animal that is allowed to accompany them is a dog. Any other activity including sports must have the consent of the owner of the common and Natural Resources Wales plus the Halkyn Graziers Association.

A recent report from our A.M. has brought to notice that 17 people have appeared in Llandudno Magistrates Court for not cleaning up their dogs droppings, this resulted in each of them receiving a £75 fine and paying £85 costs and £175 court costs.

Finally anyone living around the common will have noticed the work being carried out by the graziers in conjunction with Chester Zoo and Natural Resources Wales. As we are aware that many other people have an interest in the mountain it has been proposed that we should have meetings with members of the community to hear their points of view. Grosvenor Estate Update

Anyone who may have ventured out onto the common during the recent wet weather may have noticed some damage to grassland near Aberdo Quarry. We are aware of the damage caused and have expressed our disappointment to D P Williams, who lease the quarrying rights from the Grosvenor Estate. We have requested an investigation into the incident and expect D P Williams to return the land to its original condition as soon as practicable. We will continue to work closely with our partner organisations Natural Resources Wales and Flintshire County Council to support the conservation of this unique environment.

The Grosvenor Estate along with Heritage Lottery Fund have been supporting Flintshire County Council's Countryside Service to put plans in place to renovate three limekilns on the Common. One of these renovations has now been completed at Rhosesmor. Next on the list is the double kiln that you can see from the road between Halkyn and Rhes y Cae.

All required remediation and improvement works to mine features as identified as part of Grosvenor Estates ongoing Halkyn Management Programme have been completed with fences and grilles installed to minimise any potential risks. Capping the open fenced shaft at Windmill, remains a priority and will be completed this summer.

We were disappointed to hear of Natural Resources Wales's decision not to continue to contribute towards the Halkyn Mountain Ranger post from April 2016. Many readers will know Rachael Watson well and will be aware of the important work carried out by her to safeguard and improve the Common and its environment. Grosvenor Estate is very grateful to Flintshire County Council and North Wales Wildlife Trust who will continue with Grosvenor Estate to fund and resource the post for the next financial year.

A chance remark during a conversation between two friends over four years ago went unheeded for a couple of months until, quite out of the blue, it was mentioned again,

thus starting the path that led to the ringing of Halkyn Church Bells, as it is today. Fortunately the bells themselves, the bell chamber and the ringing chamber had all been kept in very good condition by the warden and his team. When the suggestion was proposed that a band of people could be formed to learn to ring the bells (the Tower having been silent for some time) it was discovered that one of the clappers was in need of some attention. So the clapper was duly dispatched to Taylors of Loughborough, who repaired it and posted it back to Halkyn. The clapper was then reunited with the bell, so it was all systems go!

We then decided we needed some people who would like to learn to ring.

Word of mouth soon got around and 12 people turned, up keen to be involved. Trouble was there was no-one willing to teach them!

The band were at a loose end for some time until a chance phone call about a different issue produced two people who were willing to teach them. They arrived in January 2014 expecting 3 or 4 people. To say they were surprised to find 12 is perhaps something of an understatement – but nothing tried, nothing gained.

At this point I should explain in a non-silent tower where you have established ringers, one learner would be ringing with 5 established ringers. At Halkyn they were all learning together. It is only through their grit, determination and unfailing enthusiasm that they are where they are today.

If you stay in the same sleeping posture for too long, it might cause you more pain. Besides, you will not be able to sleep well if you keep worrying about your position.

Additional Tips to Help with Sleeplessness Due to Back Pain

1. Invest in a good mattress and pillow

These are important in getting a comfortable sleep. Make sure that your mattress and pillow provide the support that your back needs. It is important to choose something that give equal support from head to toe.

In addition, herbs are known to be a lot safer than over-the-counter medicines. Halkyn Mountain Community Cinema

The community cinema is now entering its second year and we'd like to thank all the residents from across Halkyn Mountain who have supported the cinema during its first year. We've had really positive feedback and support for the cinema and the number of residents from all across the area attending the cinema has been great.

In case you haven't heard about the Community Cinema yet, its first screening was in January 2015 and it is run by a small group of volunteers from various villages across the mountain. The Community Cinema was set up "to bring the big screen to the small mountain", to enable residents and visitors to have the big screen cinema experience right here on our doorstep. With guidance and borrowed equipment from national organisation, Cinema for All, we set about finding an appropriate venue in late 2014. We were advised that comfy chairs were one of the most important things and we also considered parking, accessibility, licencing and a whole host of factors. After looking at various venues the cinema committee agreed that the Cricket Club/Sports Association on Pentre Halkyn Road was best suited to the cinema's needs and we'd like to express our thanks to the Sports Association for being so supportive of the cinema screenings.

We show films on a **Saturday evening once every two months**, generally towards the end of the month. It's really hard to know what films will be popular and we have and will continue to ask cinema attendees what they'd most like to see. To give you a flavour, to date the following films have been shown: The Grand Budapest Hotel, The Imitation Game, The Theory of Everything, What We Did on our Holiday, Pride, Jurassic World and The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel.

You can find details about all our screenings, past and future, along with anything else you might want to know about the Community Cinema on our website. Many people are surprised when they hear how much it costs to show each film and don't realise that there is a need for a film licence each time. All public screenings require a film licence, regardless of whether people are charged to watch a film or not, and this licence is a minimum of £100 per film per one screening. There is also venue hire, equipment insurance and a few other costs to be covered too. Everyone involved in running the Community Cinema does so on a voluntary basis and if there is any surplus made at a screening it is put back into the cinema fund.

Tickets for the Community Cinema are priced at just £4 per person (when bought in advance) and we hope to

keep tickets at this low price whilst still covering the costs involved.

Tickets are available to buy for each screening from The Blue Bell Inn, Halkyn and Pentre Halkyn Post Office & Store and we thank them very much for their continued support with this. Tickets can also be purchased online via the cinema website. Tickets are usually available about 3 weeks before each screening, when posters and flyers will also appear at these venues and on notice boards across the mountain.

Hot drinks, biscuits and popcorn are available to purchase at just £1 each at the screenings, to help towards the running costs of the cinema. Alcoholic beverages are also available to purchase from the Sports Association bar. And thanks to our recent successful Big Lottery Fund Awards for All grant application, the Community Cinema now has a state of the art projector, a large top quality screen, an enhanced sound system and a Blu-ray player – all for the benefit of the Community Cinema patrons to improve the cinematic experience right in the heart of the local community. What more do you need for a great night out right here on Halkyn Mountain? The Community Cinema is for you and we'd like to encourage residents from all the villages and hamlets across the mountain to come along. We hope to see you soon.

Cafe and opera at the Pig in a Wig shop. The story ends with a Christmas feast at the palace. The Grande Dame magically told the story and the


whole adventure unfolded from her sumptuous dress. There was a lot of audience participation from every age group which was great fun.



From The Rev'd Hugh Burgess

Dear Friends



It is ten years since I first started worshipping in these three parishes and on the 5th July it will be 10 years since I was installed as Priest-in-Charge. It has been, and continues to be, a huge privilege to be here to serve you. I am very grateful for the enormous support, encouragement and love that

people have extended towards me. Of course, not everything has gone well and sometimes people haven't always agreed with things I have done. We all try to do our best and to do the right thing but I am sorry for those occasions when I haven't got it right or when people have felt let down in some way. However, I am very grateful to those people who have raised issues with me directly and allowed me to either apologise or to explain. It's always much easier to deal with problems in this way and I hope that you will always feel that you can speak or write to me if there is something you'd like to raise.

During the past 10 years I have taken time off only occasionally but usually for church work in other places and I have taken very few formal holidays. This year the Church in Wales has very kindly agreed that I can take a three month sabbatical beginning at the end of February. During this time I have decided to complete a 40 year old dream and to make a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostella in Northern Spain. This is a 1500 mile walk. I shall be leaving on the 28th February and will be back early in June. In my absence, if you need to talk to a member of the clergy, please contact either the Vicar of Holywell (The Rev'd Aidan Coleman) or the Vicar of Flint (The Rev'd Brian Harvey) either of whom who will be pleased to help. All other queries can be directed to my phone where you will be given an alternate number to call and someone will get back to you.

During my absence services will take place at the scheduled times but may be a different form to that shown in the service list printed in the Halkyn Mountain News. However, there will be at least one Communion Service somewhere in the three parishes every Sunday and there will also be a Communion service in each church on Easter Sunday.

The idea of pilgrimage is a very ancient one. In the middle ages, pilgrimage was about travelling to the shrine of a saint to make penance for something you had done (or perhaps not done) and it might even be imposed as a punishment. For many people, however, the hardship of the road was often less than the challenging life they had left behind and so many pilgrims often didn't go home but continued to travel from one shrine to another. Unlike those medieval pilgrims, modern pilgrims travel as much for the experience of travelling as for arriving at the shrine, although that is still important and significant for most people. I was recently asked (by a reporter) if I was travelling for penance and I replied that even if I was, I wouldn't tell her! But just to quash any rumours, I am NOT doing this as penance for anything in particular!



Santiago, after Jerusalem and Rome, was and remains the third greatest pilgrim site in the world with over 250,000 people going there each year on pilgrimage. The road to Santiago from Halkyn will take me down the Welsh Border, across to Bristol and down to Portsmouth before crossing to Normandy and from there down through central France and by way of the little town of St Jean Pied de Port across the

Pyrenees and then along the north coast of Spain to Santiago in north west Spain. One of the things I most look forward to is meeting people from all over the world and those casual encounters will be very important to me certainly, and possibly to them too. Who knows?

But while travelling I also hope to be raising money for Jamie's Fund. Jamie was a little boy from Halkyn who died, aged 4 in 2011 while on a trip to Africa with his parents. He was a pupil at Rhos Helyg and much loved by many people. Jamie's Fund was set up to support mental health care in Uganda and the fund has just begun to build a new Mental Health

unit at Kisiizi Hospital, which should open in August of this year. If you feel able to support Jamie's Fund and encourage me you can donate through the following websites:


