Nature Conservation Group

Following the formation of the group we started on our mission on 29th of April at 7.00 o'clock in the morning. As far as we know there has never been a comprehensive bird survey for Halkyn Mountain. Many of us will remember listening to the fabulous cry of the curlew as it flew over head. This bird used to breed on the flanks of the mountain - sadly that is just a memory. The cuckoo always began singing between the 24th and 28th of April - allows another distant memory. These trends are however national due to a variety of factors including loss of habitat and intensive farming practices. Therefore, the group has decided to survey the birds we have on the mountain, over a period of a year. We were very fortunate to have the expert leadership of Dr. Anne Brenchley, co-author of the book "The Breeding Birds of North Wales".

A group of us walked from Ysgol Rhos Helyg, in Rhosesmor, along the side of Moel y Gaer, on to Wern y Gaer, past the Olchfa, then back to the school. The survey took about 3 hours and will be done again next month along the same route. Dr. Brenchley showed us how to fill in the forms, what to do and what not to do.

Many birds were noted, such as meadow pipit, skylark, greenfinch and kestrel. Of particular interest was the sighting of a linnet, Llinos in Welsh (pictured).

Apparently, the population of the linnet at present is probably as low as it has ever been having shown a dramatic fall in population. This is due to habitat loss through scrub clearance, hill 'improvement', and the intensity of grazing by sheep (which has virtually the same effect as herbicides on field weed stocks).



We cannot protect our natural environment unless we know what needs protection. This is why the group has formed - and we need YOUR help! Why not join us? We also need your observations; has anyone seen a wheatear, or heard to a cuckoo? When and where? Do let us know.

Why not come out with us next time - you'll learn a lot - I certainly did!

Plans are also afoot to protect the habitat of the rare Bee Orchid, which rarely gets the chance to bloom and set seed due to heavy grazing.

To All My Constituents in the Halkyn Ward

At last the long winter is over and there is a pleasant sense of freshness and the beauties of nature gladden every day. There have been much worse winters but the last one has been noteworthy for its longevity and particularly the never ending greyness and rawness. It has left a serious legacy: potholes. Temporary repairs have been attended to as quickly as possible, for which we should be grateful to the Highways department. But the repairs are not sturdy, with the result that as fast as one pothole is repaired another one or even two or three appear. Owing to the need for substantially more gritting being applied this year there is an equally more substantial hole in the already overburdened Highways budget. This will be considerably exacerbated by the desperate need for major road reconstruction.

The problems of education have reached new levels of concern, anxiety and sheer frustration. The unique instance has occurred this year with regard to children finishing the final term at Ysgol Rhos Helyg and transferring to their senior school. Apparently no pupil has gained a place at either Mold Alun or Holywell High School. Rumours suggest that Connah's Quay or Saltney High are the possible options. Naturally, parents are bitterly disappointed. What is so frustrating is that there seem to be no other possibilities. The statement (or even promise) that "Every parent has a right to send their child to a school of their choice" is a complete lie or a misleading fantasy based on inaccurate statistics and calculation. Admittedly there has been a noticeable increase in the birthrate but what is even more incredible is the closing of John Summers High school with about 500 pupils to be found places elsewhere.

And even more bizarre paradox occurs in Rhes y Cae. One pupil has to pay a bus fare to Mold Alun whilst others have free passes.

Readers may be aware that there is a suggestion, or even the plan, to join two or more local authorities into a much larger unit (to save money?). In reality it is another subtle or even 'sneaky' attack on our democracy. An area twice as large as at present will share one Councillor; or put it another way, twice as many people will share that one Councillor. The present plan is to join Flintshire County Council with a Wrexham Borough Council. This idea is rigorously opposed by members of all parties in both areas. The only realistic chance of saving money will be a reduction of those in managerial roles but it will double the workload of principal officers who are already are having to cope with a severely depleted work force. Moreover, there are instances where two or more councils already co-operate, e.g. waste disposal. This will be the third change of boundaries within fifty years. There will be more expense in joining authorities. At the moment the cost of joining authorities is conveniently unknown.

In a future edition of this newspaper I will try to explain how it is worked out in Cardiff that citizens in Flintshire are each worth £20 less than individuals who live in

some south east council areas. There is a remarkable formula which would give even Albert Einstein trouble to work out. The result of this extraordinary chicanery is that Flintshire, and other councils, receive much less money from the Welsh Assembly Government than several local authorities in South Wales. Therefore, Flintshire County Council receives much less cash with which to run the county, which is grossly unfair.

On a brighter note, I would like to draw your attention to the Greenfield Valley Museum. Formerly this was not a very attractive area. It has recently had a major makeover. The Greenfield Valley Museum and the surrounding area is well worth a visit. There is plenty to see and to do and refreshments can be obtained from the refurbished café.

May I also remind you of the Rhes y Cae and Moel y Crio annual Sheepdog Trials and Gymkhana to be held on the last weekend of July. Further, the Welsh Sheepdog Trials will be held at the Penbedw Estate, Nannerch, Flintshire CH7 5QT on 9th - 11th August. There are a number of events taking place in Halkyn, Rhes y Cae and Rhosesmor in the next few months. Please give your support to as many of these occasions as you can and encourage our local communities. Details will be found elsewhere in the Halkyn Mountain News.

There is no official 'holiday' for county councillors and there are no official meetings in August, when I hope to be away for part of the time. At any time, of course, if you have any problems or queries, please ring 01352 701234, though I cannot always guarantee an adequate answer - I know, because I have tried!

I wish you all a very pleasant and enjoyable summer season.

Councillor David A. Hughes – Pentre Halkyn Ward Council Members Stood in a Minutes Silence

The Chairman of Halkyn Community Council, Councillor Glyn Coleclough, addressed Members in relation to the recent sad passing of Councillor David Hughes.

Councillor Hughes had been a Member of the Council for over 30 years. Councillor Brian Coleclough stated



that Councillor David Hughes was a good Councillor, he was thoughtful, considerate and a previous Chair of Council. He took a great interest in Council work, especially the Cemetery at St. Mary's Church.

Community Defibrillators

Mr. Derek Hayes, a First Responder for the Welsh Ambulance Service who resides in Halkyn, addressed the Council Members in relation to defibrillators. During the meeting Mr. Hayes gave advice referring to the public meeting called in relation to setting up a First Responder Scheme, together with the Council's plans to install a defibrillator in Halkyn Village. Mr. Hayes explained that whilst he resided near to the Village Hall, he was in possession of his own defibrillator, which had been provided by the Welsh Ambulance Service but his uniform had been purchased personally. There was a further First Responder who resided in the Halkyn area, who did not have their own defibrillator, together with a further trained responder in Rhosesmor. With only one defibrillator between three responders, only one responder could be on duty at the same time. Mr. Hayes advised further, in relation to the cost a Welsh Ambulance Service preferred defibrillator (at an approximate cost of £1,000.00) together with the cost of a housing unit and electricity supply – the total would be approximately £1,500.00. The Council Members agreed the purchase and installation of a defibrillator and housing box, to be installed in the area of Halkyn Parish Hall.

Since the above decision, the Community Council have received an anonymous donation of £1,000.00, towards the purchase and installation of a defibrillator, together with £500.00 from the Grosvenor Estate. The Community Council have further agreed, to purchase and seek financial assistance for further defibrillators, at locations (yet to be decided) in each of the Villages in the Council area.

PCSO – Visit to Council Meeting

The Chairman Councillor Glyn Coleclough, welcomed PCSO Connor Freel to a recent Council meeting. PCSO Freel advised the Council in relation to the following reported criminal offences in the Council area:

(a) Halkyn – a number of dangerous dogs chasing sheep, road traffic accident, theft from a motor vehicle,

criminal damage, together with a number of complaints in relation to 4x4s and scrambler bikes.

(b) Pentre Halkyn – interference with a motor vehicle, suspicious circumstances, linked to criminal damage.

(c) Rhes y Cae – Animal wildlife – yew tree branches allegedly being placed to keep sheep off property, despite knowing this species of tree is poisonous to sheep (six sheep have died to date) and one incident of suspicious circumstances.

(d) Rhosesmor – Four instances of anti-social behaviour, together with numerous reports in relation to off-road and trial bikes on the mountain, including Rhosesmor Village centre.

The following further offences were reported to the Community Council:

(1) Criminal Damage – B5123 (by the masts) – people on quad bikes cut open the fence to the masts and were digging.

(2) Damage only RTC – fail to stop RTC wasn't reported to police at time but follow up enquiries located offending vehicle.

(3) Suspicious circumstances – male knocking on doors telling residents he is deaf and asking for money – Officers have attended to this male in various locations and moved him on.

(4) Dangerous Dogs – Tyddyn Uchaf Farm, Moel y Crio, Halkyn - worrying sheep, rural crime team are dealing.

(5) RTC – Rhosesmor Road, Halkyn – lorry suspected to have driven into wall – investigation ongoing.

Council Members brought the following concerns to the attention of PCSO Freel:

(1) Councillor Mrs. Delyth Taylor, referred to the complaints reported to the North Wales Police, in relation to scrambler bikes causing a nuisance in Rhosesmor Village. Councillor Mrs. Taylor related a number of instances whereby the Police had been called. In particular, when the bikes are ridden on the B5123 road – which is dangerous as children cross this section of road to gain access to the play area – including playing in the adjacent road – where the bikes were also being ridden. Concern was also expressed that the riders and pillion passengers wear no helmets.

Due to the lack of Police response and action, the matter had been reported to the North Wales Police Commissioner. PCSO Freel acknowledged the concerns with off-road bikers, including the difficulty in apprehending the culprits. The Police do not have any registration numbers, and when they attend the bikers have left. PCSO Freel advised, that Section 59 Anti-Social Notices will be issued against identified persons.

(2) Councillor Dylan Roberts referred to the number of loose dogs across the Common. PCSO Freel advised that there had been a number of reported incidents in relation to dogs not being kept on leads. These offences were recorded and are reported to the rural crime team.

(3) Councillor G. T. Robinson expressed his concerns with traffic speed in the area of Ysgol Rhos Helyg. It was reported that there had been recent checks during the morning period near to the school.

Public Notice – Street lights

Halkyn Community Council wishes to reduce both the carbon footprint and energy costs of their 131 street lights. Presently, apart from under 12 LED lights, the remainder are of the High Pressure Sodium – SOX orange coloured units. The Community Council have recently agreed a contract to replace all street lights with energy saving LED models. Four LED lights have been installed along the B5123 road in Rhosesmor – from the area of the Village Hall to the lamp near to the red phone box & notice board. Two of the LED lights are white and two with a coloured filter. The Community Council wishes to receive from residents their preference and or comments in relation as to which type of LED to install in the remainder of their street lighting stock.

From Hannah Blythyn AM



I am pleased to be able to have the chance to share updates from my work both at home in the constituency and down in the National Assembly for Wales with the readers of Halkyn Mountain News.

When I was elected two years ago, I pledged to be an accessible and visible Assembly Member for Delyn, and this is a great opportunity to be able to keep you up to date with what I'm doing to stand up for the community that shaped me.

After just eighteen months as your Assembly Member, I was privileged to be asked to serve in the Welsh Government as the Minister for the Environment, the first AM for Delyn to do so. However, it remains my priority to serve you as AM and I will continue to work hard on behalf of all our communities.

As council tax bills arrive through your letterboxes, I'd urge residents to take a few minutes out of their day and find out if they can receive support or reductions. The Welsh Government is working with councils and organisations, including Citizens Advice and Age Cymru, to make people aware of the range of support available to help them pay their Council Tax bills. Those on low incomes, with disabilities and/or live alone are just some of those who may be able to make a saving.

A new awareness raising campaign will be launched and a simple eligibility checker is now available online.

Ensuring access to superfast broadband is something that is vitally important to our rural communities and I'm keen to make sure constituents are aware of updates on progress. Earlier this year, it was announced that the Welsh Government is to introduce a broadband outreach team to support those areas not currently covered by suppliers. This approach will help rural communities and deliver solutions to the challenges facing hard to reach areas. You can contact me if you are experiencing any problems with BT or have any queries about broadband supply in your areas.

Locally, Flintshire Council has launched a consultation on county bus services and it is important that those who rely on our public transport network get involved. This is the chance for everyone to have a say on how best to spend the bus subsidy budget available and share their views. Flintshire needs an effective bus network into the future, and services must be sustainable, affordable and meet the changing needs of residents.

By engaging in this consultation, residents have a chance to shape the future of services across our community and have their say on how their needs can be met. The review will look into the current supported bus network and how best to prioritise funding where there is most need. It will include areas of Flintshire not currently served by public transport and identify any gaps where there is an existing or future need. The consultation is open until June 3rd via a survey on the Flintshire Council website.

I'm sure residents would have enjoyed watching the record breaking Welsh Commonwealth Games team in the Gold Coast in Australia last month. It was my pleasure to join Assembly colleagues to welcome home our fantastic Team Wales at the Senedd and congratulate them on their magnificent achievements as they returned with 10 gold medals, 12 silver medals and 14 bronze medals. It was also a really good opportunity to chat with fellow North Walian, and our first gold medal winner, weightlifter Gareth Evans.



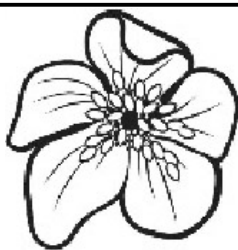
Looking ahead, I'll continue to be accessible and visible across our constituency, reaching out to all areas.

Reframing Pain

Chiropractors can sort out a lot of pain, but what happens when we can't? This article is about a technique I give my patients to help them deal with ongoing low levels of pain.

The first thing you should do, if you are experiencing recurring pain, is to get it checked out professionally. If you have nothing seriously wrong, and the problem is mechanical (i.e. bones muscles and joints) a visit to the chiropractor will probably sort it out.

However, once the pain is better, many people find that it may recur in the future. Why does the pain come back? There can be many reasons. Here are some of them:

1. Repetitive stress at work.
 2. Poor posture.
 3. The tissues become weakened and prone to re-injury.
 4. Stress or anxiety cause ongoing muscle tension.
- Loss of tissue resilience due to aging.

A combination of these and other factors often lead to tissue damage. It may take a course of treatment and rehabilitation exercises to heal, but it can be difficult to remove all the causes of the problem. For example: you may be putting a lot of stress on your shoulder because of your job as a builder; or you may be sitting for hours on end over the computer. You cannot just quit your job so the strain on your body is going to continue.

I teach my patients exercises and tricks to help avoid the worst excesses of posture but, with the best will in the world, this might not be enough. For some people, the painful symptoms will return and there is nothing they can do about it.

Well, there is! You can **reframe pain**.

As I have said, if the pain is severe and ongoing, you need to see a professional. Let's assume you have done this. You have had some treatment the pain has gone away. But now you feel it starting to come back. This can be frustrating and upsetting especially if you thought you had got on top of it.

Firstly, you need to stop the negative thoughts, let go of the frustration and upset, and think about what you can do. You must do this because negative thinking will make the pain feel worse. Remember the pain is not as bad as it was originally; it is just starting to return, don't catastrophize. It is not going to be as bad as it was before because you are going to take control.

See the pain as a warning that if you don't look after yourself things are going to go wrong. The pain is like the oil indicator light in your car. There is no need to panic if the light comes on. It comes on long before your engine has run out of oil. You have plenty of time to top it up.

By the time you have been through a course of treatment you will have learnt the main causes of your pain. So, you know what to do. Have you been working too hard, are you under a lot of stress, have you been sitting round in poor posture? It is simple, change what you have been doing and the pain will go away. The original injury will not return.

This is the reframe. Originally pain was your enemy; it ruled your life and it was unbearable. Now the pain is your friend. It is your warning light. You can say "thank you" to your body for giving you this warning before injury comes. Do what you need to take the strain from your body, and the pain will go away.
