Editorial

At the time of going to press we are reviewing delivery routes to take advantage of as many of the offers of help as possible. as it is certainly the case of "Many hands make light work".

Christmas is traditionally a time when people give extra thought to those less fortunate than they are. There are many opportunities to contribute to charitable appeals across the county.

Looking back to years gone by, there was clearly a need close to home. An edition of the Flintshire Observer, 24 December 1885 records:

HALKYN SEASONABLE BENEVOLENCE Mrs. Spencer Cooper, Springfield, has this Christmas, with her wonted liberality, given to twenty poor families in her immediate neighbourhood, a liberal supply of coal, tea, sugar, and flannel.

The edition dated 10 January 1885 records:

HALKYN.

On Friday the day scholars attending the National school and the members of the Sanday school received their usual Christmas gifts of buns and oranges from Mrs. Henry, Lygen y wern, who arrived at the school about half-past three accompanied by Mrs. Johnson Jones. Pistyll, and Miss Henry. The day scholars numbering nearly two hundred, sang one of Mason's Christmas anthems entitled Glory be to God in the Highest," after which they filed past Mrs and Miss Henry to receive their welcome gifts of buns and oranges, and afterwards showed their gratitude by giving Mm. Henry three ringing cheers.

The edition for 28 December 1899 reported:

HALKYN CHRISTMAS GIFT

The Duke of Westminster through his Agent, Mr H. Lester Smith, distributed at the Halkyn Castle Estate Office during Christmas week, a large quantity of Welsh flannel and petticoats, amongst the aged and deserving poor of Rhosesmor.

Best wishes for Christmas and the New Year.



Community Defibrillators

As reported in previous editions of the HMN, that four defibrillators were to be installed to the outside walls of

the Halkyn Parish Hall, Pentre Halkyn Community Centre, Rhes y Cae Village Hall and Rhosesmor Village Hall. The defibrillators (Zoll AED Plus – Welsh Ambulance preferred models) housed in stainless steel cabinets, have now been installed in locations shown in photographs at the end of this article

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from local First Responders to provide training sessions in the near future.

Criminal Offences Reported Within the Community

Street Scene Concerns

Mr. Neil Hickie (Flintshire County Council, Street Scene Officer) was welcomed to a meeting of the Community Council. Mr Hickey advised the Members that he had been transferred from another area in Flintshire, and was born and still resided in the Halkyn Council area. Mr. Hickie provided the Members with details in relation to his duties and responsibilities.

The following matters of concern were brought to Mr. Hickie's attention:

- (1) Litter picking in the area, in particular following grass cutting. A schedule for litter picking is in operation for the Halkyn Council area.
- (2) Dog fouling. This is a concern in all areas and should be reported to Flintshire Customer Services.
- (3) Environmental Audit. Mr. Hickie would be arranging with both County Councillors the audits across the Halkyn Council area.

Community Council Cemetery – St. Mary's Church, Halkyn

The Community Council have accepted a quotation for an extension to the footpath leading to the Community Council Cemetery at St. Mary's Church in Halkyn. The existing pathway will be extended to the bottom area of the Cemetery.

Speeding Concerns – B5123 Road - Berth Ddu to Rhosesmor

Following requests from the Community Council, including a number of concerned residents, in relation to speeding traffic on the B5123 road. In particular in the area of Ysgol Rhos Helyg, Berth Ddu and travelling towards Rhosesmor. The Community Council were provided with results from a speed survey which was carried out a number of months ago whereby the results from this survey have been analysed incorrectly. A

further speed survey will be carried out in the near future.

The Community Council also sought from the Police (under the Freedom of Information Act) the number of speeding tickets issued since 1st January, 2018 to the present date. The Council were advised that no traffic offence reports had been issued so far this year on the B5123 between Halkyn and Rhosesmor in the 40mph area. The only tickets issued were 3 in Rhosesmor itself, for exceeding the speed limit.

Brynford Recreation Ground

The Council have agreed to the hire of the recreation ground and facilities to Ysceifiog Senior and Holywell Juniors Football Clubs for the 2018/19 season. A condition survey of the football changing rooms has been undertaken. A number of issues have been identified, the electricity system was in need of upgrading which has been undertaken at a cost of £550.

The condition of the roof is very poor and the Council is currently obtaining estimations of costs to undertake repairs. Further improvements including the condition of the home and away dugouts and pedestrians' crowd barrier have been identified.

Best Kept Community Competition 2018

Councillor D. Jones and Mr. John Ward, of Brynford Pet Cemetery, attended a presentation event hosted by Flintshire County Council.

At the event the Council was presented with a Certificate of Merit for the 2018 Competition. This will be displayed at Brynford Pet Cemetery and a copy will be mounted on Brynford Village Green bus shelter.

On the 9th October, 2018 a community meeting was held to discuss next year's entry, at which a number of local residents were in attendance.

Mr. J. Ward advised that daffodil bulbs had been planted at focal points within the village. Future projects were also discussed including an area of St. Michael's Church Cemetery to be transformed into a natural habitat area and the creation of focal points at the gateways to the community boundary.

Grosvenor Estate Update

As local residents will know, a large part of Halkyn Common is owned by Grosvenor Estate and the area is managed by our team based at Eaton Park near Chester. We take responsibility for looking after the Common in a way that protects and promotes the local environment and heritage, as well as the enjoyment and safety of all who use the land.

Over the past six years, we have carried out an extensive survey of physical and environmental qualities of the Common – including mineshaft features. As a result of this work we have a more thorough understanding of the Common, and our Land Management Programme for Halkyn has been reviewed, improved and modernised.

There is an ongoing programme of remediation works in place to address any potential safety concerns, and a thorough Incident Management Plan has been established to deal effectively and quickly with all kinds of incidents, both small and large.

This Plan was rapidly put into action on Sunday, 14 October when we were notified that a mineshaft had collapsed on the Common. Whilst the scale of the collapse was significant, there were fortunately no injuries or damage to property. The incident reporting and response procedure set up by Grosvenor Estate was successfully and immediately followed to minimise all health and safety related risks.

The initial call came in around 12:30pm and we immediately attended the site to observe the extent of the collapse and met with our on call fencing contractor. By 3pm, action had been taken to install a wide perimeter of temporary fencing around the hole and signs were erected to warn people of the danger. Around 100m of steel fencing was installed the following morning to ensure that the angle of repose is covered, and to further secure the site. We are now working with our external specialist consultants, WSP, to establish a more permanent solution.

Meanwhile, we have also been planning the work schedule to secure the Moel y Crio shaft. Remediation works will be carried out in early November, and we thank you all in advance for your cooperation.

We hope that everyone feels reassured that we remain committed to the careful management of the area, and will continue to respond rapidly and effectively to any future incidents.

Dave the Haven



In the summer edition of Halkyn Mountain News, Halkyn Community Council commended the services of Councillor David A Hughes who passed away earlier in the year. I would like to add to their commendation by adding a mention of

the part he played in the community outside of his Council role and the impact he had on me and my family.

He was known to many by different names but was widely referred to as Dave the Haven, originating from his time owning and running the Haven Garage in Pentre Halkyn. He had many different interests and was always busy whether it was being councillor, mechanic, plumber, electrician, welder, ploughman, philosopher, boat builder and historian. His interests included the industrial revolution and local history (Jones Balers), mechanical engineering (especially steam and agricultural vehicles), photography, computers and narrowboats to name a few! You could describe him as our very own Fred Dibnah, even complete with engineer dustcoat and flat cap!

I knew him for over 40 years from accompanying my Dad to get his car repaired when Dave worked out of Pen y Parc Farm, then later at the Haven Garage when I too became a customer. He was always on hand to offer advice and help put right something I had 'fixed' which he would often accompany with self-appraising comments like 'pure skill'. I'm still not sure how he made any money from his time at the garage, as he was always helping people out.

Dave was an unofficial emergency service, called on by the many that knew him. If Dave didn't know how to fix something, he always knew somebody that did, and if you ever needed anything, he would have it in his shed, which was open all hours, proudly exclaiming that he "wasn't short of anything he didn't have".

Dave had a great interest in agricultural vehicles (of which he owned a few) and steam traction engines (which he would have liked to!). Every August bank holiday weekend Dave would make his annual pilgrimage to the Great Dorset Steam Fair to fulfil this interest. To finance this, he would take a van full of interesting stuff to sell on a stall conveniently located right in the middle of the auto-jumble section. Dave was in his element, wheeling and dealing whilst sat in the middle of a field surrounded by historic mechanical artefacts. From here he could go walkabout hunting for treasures to replenish his shed!

During the final years of owning the Haven Garage, Dave bought a project narrowboat to rebuild, and later went on to build narrowboats for a local company. Later still he added another skill to his growing list, Boat Safety Inspector.

Dave was one of those busy people who had wide and varied interests, he was always actively doing something, and you would never endure an uncomfortable silence in his company as he had far too much to discuss. A visit to Dave's house would normally last for hours and anybody visiting the Haven Garage on a Saturday morning would rarely be seen until closing time. He had an excitement and enthusiasm for everything and was constantly on the search for knowledge. He liked to embrace new technology and couple it with practices of old, constantly trying to solve problems. He was making his own power-saving LED lights long before they were readily available.

Dave believed that there was nobody luckier in life than him and that he had everything in his life that he could possibly wish for, especially his wife, and best friend, Lyn, who he got to marry and share his life with.

Often in life people are referred to as talkers or doers. Dave was a very rare exception, the talker who did.

Here are some of the activities we have run over the summer months.

Climbing Club at Ysgol Rhos Helyg

Following on from the taster session we did to raise money for the school PTA last year, we started a weekly climbing club, making use of the climbing and traverse walls at the school. This proved a popular club with the school children and culminated in a visit to the climbing wall at the Argoed High School.

Shooting Club In Holywell

We ran an Air Rifle Shooting Club in Holywell for young people from the local Scouting Association, Flint High School and Ysgol Maes Garmon students participating in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. This enabled them to complete their Skill Section.

Guided Mountain Walks

them with skills for life. This year we have successfully trained staff at Ysgol Rhos Helyg, Explorer Scouts in Hawarden, school teachers in Wrexham and Rhyl and Scout Leaders across Flintshire.

Archery

Over the two weeks the kids experienced archery, climbing, traversing, fire-lighting, shelter building, backwoods cooking, nature studies, pond dipping, bug hunting, woodland art and crafts, team building games and pioneering amongst other activities. They certainly went home tired! The reactions were so positive from the kids and their parents that we are considering doing another one in the Easter school break as well as next summer. Thank you to Ysgol Rhos Helyg for letting us use their grounds and facilities as a base for our activities.



Avian Life on Halkyn Mountain

In the summer edition of HMN, an article by Menna stated that there appears to be a lack of wildlife, particularly wild birds, since her childhood on Halkyn Mountain. While I can only claim to have lived on the Mountain for a mere 25 years, I have not found this to be so.

I have a large pergola at the rear of my house in Moel y Crio, on which I have set up a bird feeding station, to which more than 54 species of birds have been attracted over the years. As well as the more common birds, the more unusual ones sighted have been redstart, tree creeper, nuthatch (a regular pair), yellow hammer and greater spotted woodpecker, the resident pair bringing a youngster every year. At the far side of the garden is an area of deciduous and coniferous trees, the largest two of which reach above the house, and are both like a block of flats for birds. The conifers have housed gold crests for some time now. The large pond near to them also attracts many goldfinches for their daily baths.

The area of common near to my house, which used to be the village green, also provides habitat for sky larks, whinchats and stonechats, which can be seen sitting on the tops of gorse bushes piping away their song, and I have once or twice seen yellow wagtail here, although the pied wagtails are always on hand round and about my home. We have also sighted common lizard here on occasion.

Some years ago, I was treated to a fantastic display, which lasted some 20 minutes and right above my garden, by the resident peregrines who were teaching a youngster to catch prey in mid-air by dropping it from a height, and encouraging the youngster to stoop and catch it. The noise of their screeching was deafening, and I feel privileged to have witnessed such a sight, possibly the only time in my life that I will do so.

A tawny owl lives in the wood belonging to my neighbour, and regularly sits on the electricity pole opposite my bedroom window, calling territorially, and being answered by at least 3 other similar calls from a distance. His place in daytime is taken up by the

resident kestrel, which scans the field next door for his prey. Little owls are also seen occasionally, notably sitting on my shed roof to eat the overhanging holly berries.

A polecat also visited my garden a few years ago, to be discovered by my dog, who was hastily shepherded indoors before any damage could be done to either party, and to allow the polecat to go on his way. I also regularly see weasels and stoats scuttling across the road, and hares peering from the side of the road, or lolloping round the field next door.

Travelling down Rhosesmor hill, just past the Red Lion, some weeks ago, I saw a red kite sitting on a post, and had this sighting confirmed a week later by a friend in Rhosesmor who said that she had seen one two days previously overflying her house.

All in all, I don't think the area is doing too badly for its wildlife.

To encourage birds into the garden - DO NOT put your feeding station in the middle of the lawn - you are unlikely to get many birds visiting at all. Choose a place where you can see it easily without creating any unnecessary movement - many birds are wary of movement, and will fly off immediately, particularly the woodpecker. Choose somewhere where there is plenty of thick and quickly accessible cover, such as near a hedge, bushes, or as can be seen in the picture, near some very overgrown and accessible ivy.

Without the necessary cover, birds are very vulnerable to predators, particularly the sparrow hawk, which can even pick them off in mid-flight, being a much faster bird - and they know it! It will fly along one side of a hedge, and then suddenly roll up and over the top of the hedge, and catch panicked birds flying out of the other side.

A tawny owl, of which we have several, can even pick off birds at dusk as they are returning to roost. And watch out for fish in your pond. Disappearing fish can be down to owls as often as herons!

We even sat and watched a buzzard devouring a rabbit on our hedge one evening - with us sitting inside our conservatory, less than fifteen feet away, and trying not to move a muscle.

My picture also shows that we use squirrel proof feeders, and cap them with plastic umbrella structures. You may think this is expensive, but believe me, when you've had to replace the ordinary, cheap plastic feeders, several times a month because squirrels have eaten right through them; it is a cheaper way in the long run. Our feeders have been in place, without damage, for several years now. They also forestall those pesky jackdaws and starlings from emptying them out all over the floor within a few minutes of the flock arriving.

One has to avoid being a messenger of doom and gloom but there is so much depressing news there is a danger of becoming a total pessimist, like Victor Meldrew. Also, there is so much uncertainty and confusion that it is essential to restrict an article to pure fact.

There is one positive topic which deserves mention because it is strictly factual as well as being edifying. Over the past few years the response by so many people to Remembrance Day observation has been impressive and encouraging and especially the attendance by various children's organisations. They should be commended for supporting the tribute that their elders pay to the men and women who gave their lives many years ago so that we no enjoyed a freedom which was in danger of being lost.

The Royal British Legion exists to help the survivors of conflicts who were injured in some way. It must be stressed that supporting the British Legion is no way whatsoever glorifying wars. The very opposite is the case. In previous centuries rulers had to attract (or even force) men to form, what in many cases, where small armies. In the two World Wars everyone was involved whether or not they wanted to be. Even older children in the Guides or Scouts took part; not in fighting but in first aid, collecting waste paper or aluminium pots and pans and other vital jobs.

Nowadays, membership of the Royal British Legion is open to everyone, not only those in the armed services but also those in the auxiliary services. The Halkyn branch would warmly welcome anyone who wishes to keep the British legion alive and active; it is always good to have new blood.

The most recent meeting of the Flintshire County Council, in October, went on for over three and a half hours. After the presentation of well deserved awards to certain members of the permanent staff the big "B" provoked intense discussion, without much positive progress. Milestones in our nation's history. such as the Magna Carta or the Act of Settlement are items of major importance. In the case of Brexit the ignorance, or absence of solid facts, plus the confusion and complexity are most alarming. Whilst the referendum was carried out democratically the fact that less than half of the electorate actually voted to leave the EU must surely be a matter of serious concern. The result was certainly not a resounding victory for the leavers (though of Flintshire people 56% voted to remain). Meanwhile, we must live in anxiety and apprehension for the final result.

In the last part of the council meeting councillors raised questions about the proposed new electoral areas for Wales. In these proposals Halkyn Ward

would become part of 'Rhuddlan & Flint while the southeast part of Flintshire would become Alun and Deeside. The object is to create a system of wards which would each have about 2000 voters. Though why there should be such an obsession with numerical size when so many people do not vote is a mystery. In answer to question that I raised about the effect on matters like education I was assured that the new system would not affect educational areas e.g. 6th form pupils in Holywell (Rhuddlan & Flint) would still travel to "the Hub", Connah's Quay (Alun & Deeside). And what about waste collection? This is something I find very puzzling. Surely most people would be happier if the money spent on what is almost a cosmetic matter was used for road repairs. In spite of diligent efforts by the Highway Department to repair potholes there are still plenty of these and parts of some roads are actually breaking up before the severe winter weather starts.

I do hope I have made a mistake with the next item. That is, that the whole of County (Shire) Hall is to be demolished and the site used for housing. Premises in Ewloe will be used instead. Apart from other vital factors the cost of demolition will be enormous. I can't believe it!

In spite of the foregoing negative writing, may I wish everyone who reads the Halkyn Mountain News a very pleasant Christmas and hopefully a more encouraging and better New Year.



It is a pleasure to be updating residents in Halkyn Mountain with events and issues in the constituency and the Assembly once again. It has been a busy few months with engagements both at home in Delyn and in Cardiff Bay since my last correspondence. I pledged to be an accessible and visible Assembly Member and this summer got out across all corners delivering my newsletter, taking up issues on behalf of residents. I will continue to take the matters raised forward, with service providers and in the National Assembly for Wales. Should you wish to raise an issue on these or any other matters, please do not hesitate to get in touch – my contact details can be found at the end of this article.

Young people aged between 11 and 18 across Delyn and throughout Wales will have their chance to vote in the first ever Welsh Youth Parliament elections this November. I have visited high schools all across our constituency to talk about the new Youth Parliament with students, how they can have their say and the importance of casting a vote. The new Youth Parliament will provide a great opportunity for our young people to identify and debate the matters important to them and I want as many people from Delyn to be involved and make their voices heard. Voter registration is open until November 18 with the election taking place over three weeks from November 5-25. The results of the vote will be announced in December.

I was pleased to accept an award on behalf of my constituency team to mark one year since becoming Dementia Friendly. Delyn is home to two of three Dementia Friendly towns in Flintshire – Flint and Mold – with memory cafés providing a safe and supportive environment for people with dementia and their carers to socialise. I am proud to be a Dementia Friend and the National Assembly for Wales is committed to becoming Dementia Friendly. I'd encourage as many people as possible to become a Dementia Friend and for all of our communities to become Dementia friendly.

The Welsh Government has launched a national conversation on measures needed to combat loneliness and social isolation. It is believed one in five people experience loneliness and social isolation and can result in a number of physical and psychological problems. The Welsh Government's programme for government, Taking Wales Forward, includes a commitment to develop a nationwide and cross-government strategy to address these issues and the strategy will cover people of all ages and all backgrounds. The Welsh Government's proposed approach will focus on intervening early to prevent chronic loneliness, and ensuring that support is available for those who are, or who become, chronically lonely.

It was a pleasure to sponsor the third annual Royal British Legion Poppy Ride at the National Assembly for Wales. Members and support staff got on their bikes to take part in the thank you events being held by the RBL to mark 100 years since the end of the First World War. The Poppy Ride also highlights the important work of the Royal British Legion, a charity I'll be supporting throughout this year's Remembrance period both in Delyn and the National Assembly. In this centenary

year marking the end of the First World War, it is important we pay tribute and give our thanks to those who served and made the ultimate sacrifice.



The Hills Are Alive With the Sound Of Ukuleles

I feel we all need music in our lives. Music inspires, envigours, excites and comforts. While there are as many songs, genres and styles as there are musical tastes to appreciate them, the fundamental kernel is that music speaks to, and indeed from, the soul.

For many of us a good set of headphones and a favourite CD fulfils this musical need but for others there's a need to play, a need to express oneself. This is why actually performing music has always been so popular from pre-school to the third age, the karaoke singer to the cathedral choir, the fulfilment and achievement of contributing to a musical whole is paramount to the experience.

In recent years one instrument has stepped up to allow anyone to join in the fun; the plucky ukulele.

A complex instrument in so many ways yet simple to

pick up and "have a go", the ukulele has spawned a whole tribe of players across the world. There are clubs, festivals, online



groups and offline clubs. This inoffensive Hawaiian export has captured the hearts of many people who want to throw themselves into musical expression. The common theory that the ukulele is easy to learn is in part true and surely largely responsible for its renaissance. Yes, one can learn a handful of basic chords and strumming patterns very quickly but you can progress as high up the skill tree as you're prepared to climb. No-one can do it all of course but some of the greatest players in the world are as nimble and inspiring as any other instrumentalist. The other popular trait is the togetherness it brings. The support one gets from the ukulele community whether you're a megastar or you've just learned your first chord is, in my experience, unparalleled. I have never heard another ukulele player criticise, only ever encourage. One thing is certain, that the instrument has made its mark and is here to stay and as a musician of 40+ years I welcomed it with open arms. Since I focused on the ukulele I have made friends all over the world, released a CD and performed in some amazing places including Munich, Prague and Liverpool's legendary Cavern Club.

With all this in mind I have run a number of local ukulele nights for many years mixing sing-a-longs, open mic segments and special, guest performers. The most common question I have been asked is if I give lessons. Sadly I've never had the time to do so. However, now I find I have and so I present the idea of "The Uke Planet Pack". I have been writing a ukulele music blog for many years called "Uke Planet" and events I run also fall under this moniker. It seemed sensible therefore to stick to the branding programme as it were and spin off

into a ukulele tuition class under this same umbrella. So in January 2019 I will be starting group lessons in Halkyn Parish Hall, an inclusive session aimed at all players of all abilities and ages.

There will be group instruction, a little one-on-one time plus group sing and strum-a-longs. Everyone from beginners to club strummers are welcome and indeed this first session will be **free** of charge so just grab a ukulele, come along and have a go. The ukulele forgives and includes and you'll never be "put on the spot". More than anything I want people to feel relaxed, have a good time and hopefully learn something along the way.

Now could be the perfect time to ask Santa for a ukulele as the first tuition session will begin in January.



Full details will appear on the website (www.ukeplanet.co.uk/pack) as they develop so keep an eye on that and then come along and let your musical side thrive in a fun, educational and supportive environment. A warm welcome awaits you so let your New Year's resolution be to put a little more music into your life. It's never a bad idea.

A Foggy Encounter

I was returning from a midweek Board Meeting which had gone on far longer than anticipated mainly due to junior members trying to impress our Chairman with non-important items brought up under Any Other Business. This had delayed matters somewhat and I found myself driving home on Wednesday, 22nd December, 1972, in a thickening fog.

I had about a 3 hour drive ahead of me which wasn't too difficult through the towns but became tiring when I was on the country roads without the help of street lighting. I was concentrating as best I could and making good progress anticipating the first G&T in front of the fire at home.

I knew the roads quite well and was nearing the part of the A41 as it passed the old RAF Airfield at Prees Heath when I came to a quite dense patch of fog causing me to slow down. It was then that I saw a figure of a man crossing the road in front of me. I slammed on the brakes but was not quick enough and hit him squarely on. There was an awful bang as he hit the windscreen and his hat went flying to the left.

I screeched to a halt about 40 yards on and jumped out of the Jaguar leaving the hazard lights flashing. I hurried back to where I thought I had hit him, expecting to see him dead in the road but there was no sign of him anywhere. He may be in the roadside ditch, I thought, and cursed the loss of my torch a few weeks before. I searched and searched but this was hampered by the thick fog. I decided it was no use, I needed help. As no motorist had passed during the time this had all taken place, about 40 minutes, I made up my mind to press on to the Police Station in Whitchurch. As you can imagine, by the time I arrived 15 minutes later I was shaking like a leaf and feeling like death.

I rang the bell on the front desk and was surprised at the speed at which the Sergeant appeared. "Good evening sir, what can we do for you?" said Sergeant Wilcox, who was in his mid 50's and had a portly figure of a police officer coming to the end of a long career in the force.

"I think I've just knocked someone down in my car and fear I have killed him" I replied.

"You certainly look shaken to me", said the Sergeant. "I think you had better sit down and tell me all about it". With that he bellowed "PC Brownlea, get yourself in here", and a young officer, at most 20 years old, immediately appeared obviously trying his hardest to impress his Sergeant as he was buttoning up his tunic as he walked into the office and was then detailed to make two strong cups of tea. Whilst he was performing this task, Sergeant Wilcox started to question me, at the same writing out his report.

His first question was to ask me to identify the point at which the accident had taken place and he then instructed PC Brownlea to take a Panda car and a strong torch to search for the victim. I got the feeling that the Constable was pleased to be allowed to drive the Panda and get away from the office for a while. The Sergeant dated his report December 22nd, 1972 and, after checking with myself, noted the time of the accident as approximately 8.10pm. He then asked me to give him the full details of all I could remember of the incident with the unfortunate man.

As you can imagine, the details were very clear in my



mind and I explained that it had been an airman wearing an overcoat with, I thought, Corporal stripes on his sleeve. As I hit him, his hat had gone flying and I could, therefore, see him quite clearly and he had dark hair and a moustache.

Sergeant Wilcox wrote all of this down then asked me to tell him about the airman's hat.

"Was it the peaked 'going out' type the RAF seems to expect their airmen to use when out in public or was it the beret type they wear when on fatigues?"

"No", I replied. "It was the forage cap which I think they call a cheese cutter".

At this point Sergeant Wilcox got up to make another cup of tea whilst we waited for the young Constable to return but said, "I think you have just bumped into Corporal Baxter".

"Who is Corporal Baxter?", I asked and the Sergeant explained that the Corporal was an engine fitter at RAF Prees Heath during the war who had been given a 7 day leave pass as it was Christmas, which commenced at midnight on Wednesday 22nd December. He was looking forward to spending Christmas with his wife and two young daughters at their home up in Cumbria. His Warrant Officer had taken pity on him and told he could leave the Camp early as he had finished the work he was doing stripping down an engine from an Anson used by the Station Commander.

A happy Corporal Baxter left the Camp at 8pm and was crossing the foggy A41 when he was struck by a vehicle which did not stop and he was killed instantly. Sadly, he never did get to spend Christmas 1942 with his wife and daughters.

I was very shaken by this story and asked the Sergeant how he was so well informed.

"Well", he said, "In 1942 I was a young 20 year old Police Constable who was sent to the scene and witnessed the carnage outside the RAF Camp and you are not the first to see an apparition of the Corporal". Sergeant Baxter then went to a filing cabinet and produced a folder which contained two Reports pertaining to the accidents thought to have taken place outside the RAF Camp, each one dated 22nd December at 8.10pm, one in 1952 and another in 1962.

The Sergeant then said, "We will wait for the return of PC Brownlea but my guess he will not have found any sign of an accident".

The Constable duly returned and reported that although my skid marks had been plainly visible, there was no sign of a victim.

Sergeant Wilcox turned to me and said "Well, I think we can wish you a goodnight, Sir, and a pleasant journey home".

I might add that every Christmas I always spend the evening of 22nd December at home in front of a warm fire with my family, and nothing will induce me to venture out on that night!



At our Christmas meeting this year we will have a seasonal buffet, followed by entertainment.


The members of the W.I. meet in Rhosesmor Village Hall at 7.15pm on the second Monday of each month except August, which is a holiday month.



Tender Spots

Patients often say things to me like, "How do you know exactly where the pain is" or "Your hands are like magnets they go right to the painful bit".

When patients talk about these painful spots, they mean that I find the tender spots; areas that they did not know were tender until I prodded them. At any one time there is a small percentage of people in pain, but there is a much larger percentage of people who have tender spots and do not know it. Many people are walking along the high street oblivious to the fact that they have tender spots in their backs.

Tender spots can come and go, and they are nothing to worry about. If you have a tender spot for a prolonged period it may be an indicator that there is something more significant going on under the surface; a tender spot may be a precursor to pain in the future.

The same goes for stiffness. We all get stiffer as we get older. We may also feel stiff after we have exerted ourselves, but long-term stiffness indicates muscle tension and joint restriction which may be a precursor to pain.

Most people who come to see me with an episode of severe back pain describe stiffness and low levels of pain leading up to it.

Tenderness, low levels of pain and stiffness are signs that the body is not functioning as well as it might. If they persist, you should not ignore them. Go and get them checked out by a chiropractor. Not only are these symptoms precursors to more severe pain, they are also an emotional and energetic drain. You may feel down and become grumpy due to low level pain symptoms. With treatment you will feel better, not just physically but mentally and emotionally too.

After someone has recovered from a severe episode of back pain, they often still feel stiff and have tender spots, so, although they feel better, the problem has not gone altogether. If they stop having treatment it is likely that the pain will return in future. I can only be sure that someone is better when tender spots and stiffness have disappeared, so when my patient says, "You know how to find the painful spots", I am sure they mean it as a compliment!

Stan Price

Stan was born on April 23rd 1926, the fourth of 8 children, in Penllongley Cottage which lies midway between Pentre Halkyn and the Milwr. When Stan was still a child the family moved to Number 1 Maes Lygan in Pentre Halkyn. Little did Stan know at this time that he would spend the rest of his life living within 5 miles of this house.

Stan attended Halkyn School and with the rest of the family worshipped in Halkyn Church. He was to remain a loyal member of this church for the whole of his life. Around 1937, he attained a scholarship to the Grammar School in Holywell and, despite the lack of funds in the family, they made sure he was able to make the most of this opportunity.

When he was 18 years of age, in 1944. Stan left Pentre Halkyn for the first time. He was called up to the army and after basic training (including jungle warfare in Northumbria) he was posted to India and later in Burma. After the War he became a loyal member of the Burma Star Association attending the annual remembrance service in the Albert Hall.

On return to Britain in 1947 Stan was, for some time an insurance agent before joining a firm that were subcontracted to John Summers Steelworks. He later became employed by John Summers and remained there for the next 30 years or so. In the meantime he had met Bessie Jackson, a Halkyn girl, and they married in 1950 at Halkyn Church.

They briefly had homes in Rhosesmor and at Library View in Halkyn, but having become parents, following the birth of Pat, they needed something bigger and in 1955 were one of the first residents of the newly built Allt y Plas in Pentre Halkyn.

It was not long after this that Stan was given a job at the steelworks in Port Talbot. However neither he nor Bessie were inclined to leave Halkyn so Stan ended up working away from home for extended periods. He dearly missed his family and his home life around Halkyn and in 1959 secured a job back in Shotton. By this time his second child, Susan, had been born and Stan was resolved never to leave the Halkyn area again.

It was at this time that Stan became more involved with his father in reporting local events

for the Flintshire County Herald and the Flintshire Leader. Stan's father had lost most of his sight but was always able to find out exactly what was happening on Halkyn Mountain. This involved full coverage of weddings, funerals concerts and the like. When Stan's father died in 1969 Stan took over the role of correspondent and retained this for nearly 30 years. Alongside this he became a member of the Halkyn Parish Council, Halkyn Cricket Club, Halkyn Football Club and Halkyn British Legion. He also became a regular member of the Britannia Inn "Dominoes and Debating" society, meeting weekly on a Friday night. He was also the regular Master of ceremonies at local events, always ready with a joke or a monologue. His double act with the late Raymond Smith was a legend in its own time. At this time Stan was also the Leader at Halkyn Youth Club, and when the occasion arose the Presiding Officer for Local and General Elections.

In short, if it happened in Halkyn Stan was part of it!

In the late 1970's he was central to the reformation of the Halkyn Bowling Club which, after a modest start on one of the member's large lawn, finally found a permanent home in Pentre Halkyn, a real legacy for future generations in the village. In later years the friendships he made in the bowling club would be very important to him, and right to the end he held the honorary title of President.

Although he enjoyed his home comforts he did enjoy travelling when he could. Accompanied by either his brother Douglas or his brother in law Vince he visited countries ranging from Australia to Iceland. In later years he continued to enjoy breaks away with his good friend Iris.

In the 1990s his sister Doreen was elected Mayor of Delyn and Stan had a very enjoyable year acting as her Consort. It involved lots of trips and meeting new friends, and this of course was right down his street.

It would be totally remiss not to mention Stan's passion for football. Although he played for Halkyn, he gained most enjoyment from following his beloved Everton FC. A true "Toffee", along with his brother Noel, he supported them through thick and thin. Although Stan only had 2 children, his family was to increase as he and Bessie decided, in 1970, to become foster parents. Initially they

would care for children in the infancy stage, but all that was to change in 1973 with the arrival of Lisa. A short term fostering led to them providing a loving upbringing for Lisa for the next 23 years. Lisa remains a part of the family although now living independently.

At about the same time Stan became a grandad for the first time with the birth of Andrew. Further grandchildren followed with Sarah, Ben and Dan. In 2010, to his great delight, his first great grandchild, Maisie arrived, followed a short while later by Finn.

Stan's life has not always been easy. Sadly he lost his beloved Bessie in 1996, and the new millennium saw him fighting and surviving a number of serious health issues. However he always remained positive and continued to lead his life to the full. He knew everything that was going on. His local knowledge was supplemented by avid reading of the Daily Post. The crossword had to be completed daily, and the highlight was reading (in his words) the section on Hatches, Matches and Despatches.

In 1998 Stan moved home for the last time to a bungalow in Rhosesmor. Here he renewed old friendships and made many new ones including his many friends at the Thursday Exercise Club.

It goes without saying that Stan was a popular man, known to everyone locally. However it was in the company of his family that he really revelled. This love and respect was fully reciprocated and this was clearly shown in 2016 on the occasion of his 90th birthday when over 80 members of his extended family travelled from all over Britain to share the evening with him.

So there we have it with Stan. A Father, Grandfather, Taid, Uncle and loyal friend to all who knew him.

As a final message we say "It is Goodbye from us to the "Life and Soul" of our parties and the "Love of our Lives"

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
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
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


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
