Editorial

This is the Last Issue of Halkyn Mountain News - Or is it?

The current team which produces and coordinates delivery of the Halkyn Mountain News have decided to retire, and have notified the Trustees of this. There is no single reason for this, but responsibilities have been shared by a small team who now have other commitments or as in the case of our Treasurer, is no longer living in the area.

Prior to the Covid 19 Pandemic and Lockdown, we have made several appeals in editions of the Halkyn Mountain News for new volunteers, and while offers of help to deliver copies to the five mountain communities have been forthcoming, there has been little interest in the key roles such as desktop publishing and editing, Treasurer, and liaising with advertisers.

There is an established group of contributors both from local groups and organisations and as well as individuals, although there is always room for more. There is also team of volunteers who deliver the 1800+ copies to individual properties each quarter. However, in the absence of new volunteers for key roles, sadly this will be the final edition produced.

In order for the paper to continue, the following roles all need to be filled:

- Desk Top Publisher & Editor at least 1 but ideally 2.
- · Proof reader.
- Treasurer including liaison with advertisers (this could be separated into 2 roles).
- Distribution co-ordinator 1
 (collection of copies from printers and batching for individual deliveries).
- Distribution co-ordinator 2 (to deliver batches of copies to individual deliverers).

The current team will be happy to work with a new group to provide initial support and guidance to ensure a smooth handover.

The HMN is financially solvent and is self-funding though advertising revenue from local service providers. Community Councils have also kindly provided grants when needed. With the current level of advertisers and expenditure, no fundraising is required.

Council Budget & Community Charge for 2022/2023

The Councilors agreed not to increase the budget for the financial year 2022/2023 – in particular, due to the current pandemic situation. The Council budget will remain at £50,000. The Band D property charge will be £37.19p, an increase to the current charge of £0.29p a year (0.79%). The increase is due to the reduced number of properties in the area from the Band D column.



Halkyn Children's Play Area

The refurbishment of the this Children's Play area has been completed at a cost of just over £20,000. The Halkyn Community Council provided the sum of £10,000 towards the upgrade.

Street Scene

The following concerns were reported:

B5123 Road – travelling from the A541 towards Rhosesmor. A road sign has been knocked and is lying flat on top of the hedge on the left-hand side approaching the top of the hill prior to the turning to Wern Road.

A number of highway markings have faded at junctions in the Rhosesmor area; such as the roads alongside the play area; near the Cenotaph and Church. Could a review of all the junction markings be arranged please?

Concern expressed that a high wall sited between the Rhes y Cae play area and adjacent property, formally known as the Rhes y Cae Primary School, whereby the wall was apparently blown down during recent high winds. The area is now open and exposed whereby children can climb over the breeze blocks. The Clerk to contact Aura Leisure seeking an urgent inspection and to make safe,

The tree canopies on the B5123 road travelling from the area of St. Mary's Church towards Halkyn; the area near the cattle grid the tree branches are catching high sided vehicles. Also, on the slip road from near the Church to the Britannia Inn a branch is touching the wall. The Clerk advised, that he would contact both Neil Hickie (Street Scene) and Stuart Body (Flintshire Tree Inspector).

Large weeds including nettles growing either side of the footpath in the area of the pensioners bungalows in Pentre Halkyn (across road from Post Office).

Complaint received together with photograph of person walking their dog on Pentre Halkyn Football Pitch. There have been a number of incidents of dog fouling on the football pitch, with one junior match called off due to the condition of the pitch. The Outpost is the community shop open in St Paul's Church, Rhosesmor. We stock local goods such as local chocolates, fudge, cakes, chutney, relishes, eggs, veg - all supporting local suppliers. You'll also find everyday needs, milk, butter, bread, cereals, crisps, biscuits and lots, lots more. Your ideas are welcome in the suggestion box which influences the stock. We have already begun a co-op where members of the community with surplus veg can put them in the shop, be part of a network of growers and get seeds or plants for the next season.



The pandemic urged us to consider our community and how we could help to end the isolation and provide a service lost when the local shop closed. The church was open all day, everyday anyway and therefore seemed an ideal hub at the centre of the village. The 'Welcome' coffee corner is available from 8.15 am until 6.00pm and there's always a friendly face to welcome you at The Outpost. A magic shop, The Outpost was designed by Natalie Griffiths (manager) so that it can fold away into a corner when space is needed for a large gathering in the church.

The next step was to ask for volunteers and we were amazed when 37 people immediately came forward to plan a rota offering a couple of hours a fortnight. This group has turned into a mutually supportive community group who keep in touch on the Outpost WhatsApp page. Thanks to the phenomenal team spirit of the group and their pride in what they are doing The Outpost recently received its 5-star rating in Food Hygiene.

The ethos of The Outpost is to be a valuable resource for the village, providing a safe and fair environment that welcomes anyone who needs us, to continue to walk alongside the community and grow with the community needs and to give opportunity to those in the community who would like to improve their skills through work experience, volunteering and courses. The Outpost supports local businesses and works with the church and its vision for the future. To sum up it is driven by the community for the community.

In order for The Outpost to work we need volunteers. It was created for the village and it will take a village to make it a success. 
The Uke Pack are Back

An Invasive Shrub Threatening Halkyn's Rare Species

The North Wales Cotoneaster Control Project aims to help our local wildlife by controlling invasive, non-native cotoneaster.

What is cotoneaster?

Cotoneaster is not native to the UK however; it has become a very popular garden shrub and many species have now escaped from gardens and become invasive weeds.

Why is cotoneaster a problem?

If you have cotoneaster in your garden then you may be aware that it attracts bees, birds and other pollinators and in the right place, can benefit wildlife. However, the wind, birds and other animals can spread the seeds and help cotoneaster escape over the garden wall. This introduces them into the wild, where they damage native vegetation and can be difficult to eradicate. On Halkyn Common, this has become a persistent problem as the cotoneaster is spreading and tends to blanket and shade out other native and rare species within its range, leaving fewer nectar sources and food for native wildlife that rely upon limestone grasslands. Halkyn has many important and rare species which are associated with limestone substrate including adder's tongue, autumn gentian and stemless thistle. We are particularly concerned about four types of cotoneaster:

hollyberry (C. bullatus),

wall cotoneaster (C. horizontalis),

small-leaved cotoneasters (*C. microphyllus agg*) and Himalayan cotoneaster (*C. simonsii*).

All these species are listed on Schedule 9 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act in England and Wales therefore, it is an offence to plant them in the countryside or even allow them to escape from your garden!

How we are trying to eradicate cotoneaster

North Wales Wildlife Trust and Natural Resources Wales are working together to remove cotoneaster from Halkyn Common and other protected sites in North Wales. "Limestone grasslands disappearing from our landscapes would be a huge loss, and getting people involved in conserving them locally can have real benefits – for individuals, communities as well as our wildlife!" says the North Wales Wildlife Trust Cotoneaster Project Officer, Hannah Everett. A similar project took place by the Dorset Wildlife Trust at the Isle

of Portland as cotoneaster was smothering and killing much of Portland's native plants and wildlife it supports.

Depending on various factors, the cotoneaster will generally be cut, and stump treated with a suitable herbicide to prevent re-growth (dye marked). The contractors and volunteers will be following ecological best practice by checking for any nesting birds and amphibia in order to prevent any harm or disturbance to them.



Both organisations will be releasing further information about this project on their social media accounts and there will be information in the notice boards at Halkyn, Pentre Halkyn, Rhosesmor and Rhes Y Cae soon so keep an eye out for those! How YOU can help

Native nectar plants offer better quality food sources to a wider range of species than non-native cotoneaster, as they are matched to the local species. If you'd like to attract birds to your garden with berries, better alternatives include Hawthorn, Holly, Honeysuckle, Guelder rose, Rowan, Firethorn.

Perhaps the most bird-friendly thing you can do is to leave your late-flowering perennials intact until after the worst of the winter. Seed eating birds will feast on the seeds of teasels, asters, sanguisorba and various daisies like ox eye. The twiggy stems and spent flower heads will shelter small insects, and wrens are very fond of frisking through them for food.

Top tips to remove cotoneaster from your garden and stopping it accidentally spreading

Place plastic sheeting or a blanket underneath the cotoneaster to be removed (to catch the falling berries). Cut back the stems and carefully collect all the cuttings together. Treat the exposed stumps with appropriate herbicide.

Take the cut material and collected berries to a disposal centre that deals with non-native invasive species and never dispose of garden waste on the common.



Vegetation Management Works at Moel y Gaer Hillfort

Vegetation management work has been carried out within the ramparts of Moel y Gaer the Iron Age Hillfort situated above Rhosesmor. This work has been instructed and permitted by Cadw who are the historic environment service of the Welsh Government. They work to protect the historic buildings and structures, the landscapes and heritage sites of Wales, so that the public can visit them, enjoy them and understand their significance. It is possible to find out in more detail what Cadw do by visiting www.cadw.gov.wales A statement from Cadw explaining the reason for this happening follows:

"The entirety of the scheduled area is currently heavily vegetated with mature gorse (Ulex gallii and U. europaeus), with limited areas of open grassland. This dense vegetation cover has a negative impact on the condition of the scheduled monument. Stock (sheep), grazed to maintain a healthy grass and herbaceous sward are increasingly confined to reduced areas and pinch points, encouraging erosion of the ground surface in these places. Visitors to the site are similarly confined to narrow pathways through the gorse,

resulting in trampled, muddy, and in places, eroded access points. The dense cover prevents visitor appreciation of the monument, as the visual context of the site is lost, and features such as the defensive ditch and bank systems are concealed. The maturity of the gorse is also a fire hazard, and burrowing animals (rabbits) are using it as cover. Removal of the gorse, and encouragement of a low herbaceous sward will therefore greatly benefit the condition of the monument, and assist in its future positive management."

The plan is to carry out the work over the next 3 years using tractor and flail and then removing the cut material.

A few words from Danny the Donkey



How to Sleep Comfortably with Back Pain

If you stay in the same sleeping posture for too long, it might cause you more pain. Besides, you will not be able to sleep well if you keep worrying about your position.

Additional Tips to Help with Sleeplessness Due to Back Pain

1. Invest in a good mattress and pillow

These are important in getting a comfortable sleep. Make sure that your mattress and pillow provide the support that your back needs. It is important to choose something that give equal support from head to toe.

2. Try some herbs that help with sleep

Natural sleep remedies such as herbs do not just help you fall asleep and stay asleep, but they can also promote muscle relaxation. In addition, herbs are known to be a lot safer than over-the-counter medicines. You could get herbs such as Valerian, Chamomile, St. John's Wort, Hops, Wild Lettuce, and many others, either as a supplement or in tea form. You could also try some Aromatherapy using Lavender.
