


#### Issue/Rhifyn 197 - Winter/Gaeaf 2025

#### A Few Words from Blodwen the Sheep

Life on the mountain is always interesting. It is often assumed that life as a sheep must be boring with one day being much like another. However, nothing could be further from the truth as every day brings surprises.

A little while ago, I was strolling with some friends and casually grazing along Wern Road in Rhosesmor when we noticed that a gate which is normally firmly barred, was ajar and was just inviting us to enter. Clearly the owners had left it open for us. We couldn't resist the adventure of entering the garden. What a feast lay before us! There were plants we had never seen before and flowers which looked delicious. We knew that we could eat well and leave the garden neatly trimmed. There were so many different tastes and textures. One of my friends who is a real foodie ewe commented that it was a wonderful taster menu and a "smor gas board of delights". I have no idea what she was talking about, but it sounded exotic, so I just nodded.

I just had to try a little of everything. Time flew by but I was completely in my own world, savouring plants I had never tried before. My foodie friend said we had eaten the finest Hide Ranger, Roady Den Drums and Jar Rainy Mums she had ever come across. I did take a nibble of something my friend said was Roobarb, but it brought tears to my eyes and made my lips curl. As we left, we admired our handywork. We had successfully trimmed nearly all the plants and had tidied them by eating all the leaves and trimming all the stems. I was so full, and I fear I knocked over a plant pot as I left as I was now a little wider than when I arrived!

I settled down early for the night as in truth, I think I had eaten more than I should and was beginning to feel a little queasy. I must have slept for quite a while when I awoke to the sound of thunder. The problem was that the thunder was inside my belly and before long I think lightning had also started as well as there was certainly a lot of noise going on down there. The next day was not a pleasant one. I decided that exotic eating was not for me, and I should stick to a plain mountain diet in future. Perhaps the grazing isn't always better on the other side of the gate. There is something to be said for eating wholesome plain food. On a positive note, I'm sure the owners of the garden were delighted with our work, when they returned home.

The lambs are all growing up so quickly and soon find their independence, especially the young rams. They don't stay around long as it seems to be a tradition that they go on a lads' holiday. The problem is that once they have a taste of the high life they rarely return. I was born on Halkyn Mountain and have lived all my life here without straying from it, so geography is not my strong point. However, I do know of places where other sheep have once lived such as Northop, Cilcain and even Abergele. From what I know, the ram lambs go on holiday to Abertwa. Wherever that is it must be a great place given that they stay permanently. Only the other day I was chatting to Esme the oldest ewe in our flock, she confided that she had heard that Abertwa was only a stopping off place for the destinations of Iceland and Tesco. It was a little strange that she spoke to me in hushed tones but given my poor geographical knowledge, I didn't admit that while I had heard of Iceland, I have no idea where Tesco is. It doesn't sound local so perhaps it is near to Iceland or it could even be a remote Scottish island.

When you next see us grazing on the mountain, remember my words here and that our lives are rarely quiet and simple. We sheep experience so many different adventures (such as the above fine dining experience). With there being so many of us, at any given time there is always a sheep in need of help in some way or another. We also have plenty of fun activities, but these only take place when we are sure there are no humans in the vicinity.

You may have seen Barbara on the mountain. You can identify her by her pronounced limp. You might assume she had missed her footing or got her ankle caught in the gorse, but truthfully, it was the result of her defending her title as backflip champion. After holding the title for three summers, she landed badly and lost the title in the process. Poor Barbara, it was her pride that suffered most. Very few of us have the courage to attempt backflips as it is amazingly difficult to right yourself should you land on your back and find yourself up-

side down. I suspect that many of you humans have the same problem. If in the middle of the night recently you are awoken by loud bleating then I apologise on behalf of the flock, we were probably just cheering Barbara on.

There is talk on the mountain of an appetite from more daring activities. Walking the barbed wire tightrope has been mentioned as well as cattlegrid rolling. I don't like the sound of either. Even if a less adventurous sheep doesn't feel like taking part in activities, there is always much to watch. Personally, I am fascinated by humans walking up and down with noisy contraptions which nibble grass at an alarming speed. I suspect humans have poor teeth and are unable to tear the grass themselves, so use the machine to collect it for them to eat indoors.

As I prepare my thoughts for this edition of Halkyn Mountain News, I am sitting in the light of the full moon – the brightest for a while. It is always nice to gaze at the moon and wonder how many other sheep across the land are doing the same. Yes, life on the mountain is always interesting.

#### HOLYWELL HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Following on from the resounding success of the first History Fair in June, we are proposing to host another one around Easter next year. We are sure that, as we have proved our worth, we will attract even more local history groups to take part. We had twelve groups at the June Fair, and we know there are many more out there who we're sure will be happy to show what they are doing to preserve the history of their area.

Representatives of our Reminiscing Group visited Llys Gwenffrwyd residential home in Holywell recently and had a great time sharing some of our archives

and publications. According to the feedback from the activities organiser, the residents haven't stopped asking when we'll be visiting again. We have also been contacted by Rhuwlas, a care home in Flint. The mother of one of our members lives there and has recommended that we come along and share our Flintshire archives with the residents. As we've said before, we truly appreciate the value of reminiscence, especially for those living with dementia or Alzheimer's. Familiar images and memories can often prompt conversation, recognition, and connection — and it's always a privilege to be part of that process.

On the other end of the age scale, we have forged links with the Head of Humanities at Holywell High School, Siobhan Henry, who is as passionate as we are about local history and keen to bring her students on our history walks around the town. She has, for some time, wanted to form a history club at the school - she said that we have now inspired her to go forward with that venture, and hopes that we would be able to come into the school to give talks to the students on the history of the town. Siobhan was kind enough to gift us some of the logbooks from the school - handwritten by the headmaster at the time, the late Mr Richards. Sadly, some of the logbooks have been lost in the transition from the old school to the new but she thankfully managed to salvage others and was glad to find a permanent home for them.

As the summer has come to a close, we are now turning our thoughts to putting together our next Olde Holywell calendar. This year our theme is old and new, and we hope to find a selection of photographs of areas of Holywell from years gone by and pair them with a recent photograph of the same area. This is a popular historical theme for calendars and we hope it will sell as well as last year's calendar. Throughout autumn we aspired to sign up to attend local Christmas Fairs, the perfect event to promote our calendars and Christmas cards, which also sold very well last year.

We are pleased to report that our new relationship with Greenfield Valley has got off to a promising start with regards to sales of our three books; the children's book on the history of Holywell and the two books on Growing up in Greenfield Valley and Bryn Celyn, written by our member Cynthia Roberts. He enjoys all the research, finding out about the different stories linked to the people named on the gravestones. He uses different websites and combines the information to get the complete story.

He thinks he will be doing it for a long time - the more he finds out the more there is to find out.

#### **Rhosesmor WI**

This year marks the 110th birthday of the first WI to be established in the UK. The original WI



was founded in Ontario Canada in 1897. It only took 18 years to cross the Atlantic, when Llanfair PG in Sir Mon was the first in the UK to start their own WI. There are approximately 6,300 WIs in the UK now with a membership of about 220,000 women. Over the years members have taken part in all sorts of activities including drama, craft, cooking, day coach trips, holidays, running food distribution centres, to name but a few. Campaigning is something they have thrown themselves into since its establishment supporting women's rights, environmental issues, support for carers and many more. There is really something for everyone in the WI.

Each member receives news magazines throughout the year. In a recent one a WI member was highlighted, as she too is celebrating her 110<sup>th</sup> birthday this year. She still lives independently, enjoys working in her garden, helping out in the community, including assisting with the local toddler group. #### Message from Hannah Blythyn MS

Recently in the Senedd I took part in a debate on the Draft Budget for 2026-27, which marks the start of the budget process for



the next financial year — the Final Budget is due to be put before the Senedd in January and it's vitally important for Wales, not least because we're heading for a Senedd election in May and there is still a lot of work to do to tackle the lasting impact of more than a decade of cuts under previous UK governments. When it comes to the challenges we face and to inform the decisions we need to make, it's crucial that those who provide our services are front and centre. That's why I spoke about the importance of working together through social partnership, giving a real voice to those on the frontline of our public services. When we returned to the Senedd following the summer, I raised the need to prioritise improvements and mitigating measures on the A55 in the Senedd, particularly around junction 32 where, sadly, a number of serious accidents have taken place this year. These incidents have a knock-on impact on our communities and for those visiting North Wales. A number of constituents have contacted me with their concerns, so its welcome news that the Welsh Government has, among other things, allocated £30m of additional funding to ease congestion in North Wales — however, I will keep advocating for our area and pressing for improvements.

Since my last Halkyn Mountain News column, we have seen the introduction of the Bus (Services) Bill in the Senedd – this landmark legislation will help to bring about the transformation of bus travel so that it serves our people and places rather than profits. In practice, the Bus Bill will mean one joined-up network, with one timetable and tickets that can be used across the network on buses and trains and it will allow publicly-run bus companies to provide services that are shaped by our communities, allowing us all to have a greater say on which routes go where.

The introduction of the Bus Bill comes on the back of the Welsh Government's new MyTravelPass scheme, which allows 16 to 21-year-olds to pay just £1 for a single bus journey or travel all day for £3 – the latest figures show that 26,000 young people have applied for the pass since its launch in Sep-

tember. Schemes like this really do make a difference and help to open up opportunities for young people, as well as support routes which otherwise might be under threat, linking our communities across North Wales. I also raised with the Welsh Government the need for better digital displays at bus stations to make public transport even more accessible and attractive for everyone. In recent months I've been trying to get out and about as much as possible here at home including continuing my street surgeries, where I can talk to people about the issues they care about in the places they live. It's so important to

talk to local people in my job as your representative and these street surgeries are a good way to engage people who wouldn't normally come into my office. If you have an issue you would like to discuss with me, whether it's transport, education, health, housing or something else, then please get in touch and I will do all I can to help you. I also hold regular face-to-face, phone or online help and advice sessions — feel free to get in touch with my office to arrange an appointment using the contact details at the bottom of this column.

Earlier in the autumn I popped into the Holywell and Area Community Museum on the high street in Holywell to catch up with John Wiltshire and I was back there again recently to attend the unveiling of the model coal mine - the model mine featured in the new series of the BBC's The Repair Shop recently. My thanks to John for inviting me – the model was made by his grandfather in 1904 and he needed some help to get it working again so it could take up its place at the centre of the Point of Ayr Colliery exhibition. Like many in our area, I have family who worked at the Point of Ayr colliery - including my Taid and my Uncle - so I'd like to once again pay tribute to John who has been instrumental in ensuring that our heritage is recognised and remembered. Regular readers will know that I like to champion some of our excellent local food and drink producers — our corner of North East Wales has a lot to offer in terms of food and farming, and our great food and drink festivals and the Denbigh and Flint Show showcase some of our best local products.

In the autumn I had the chance to drop in to Cariad Gin at the Clwydian Range Distillery near Halkyn Mountain to sample some of their drinks. Run by Fiona and Simon Lewis, the distillery makes gin and other drinks using a traditional copper still and carefully-chosen and prepared botanicals and infusions. The family-run firm also do a delicious coffee liqueur which is well worth seeking out — it could be a good one for Christmas! I also had the chance to meet the tortoises roaming around in the gardens, the tortoise being the company's logo.

As a member of the Senedd's Economy, Trade and Rural Affairs Committee, I often speak on the subject of animal welfare and during the summer I pressed on the next steps towards phasing out greyhound racing in Wales, so it was good to see the first draft of the legislation banning greyhound racing published in recent weeks. The Prohibition of Greyhound Racing (Wales) Bill makes it an offence to use a stadium or similar venue for greyhound racing and also makes it an offence to be involved in organising greyhound racing in Wales. This Bill reflects growing recognition that greyhound racing is incompatible with modern animal welfare standards. I've long campaigned for legislation on greyhound racing, joining the RSPCA in their calls for the sport to be banned - according to the organisation, 2,700 greyhounds were killed and more than 26,500 were injured from greyhound racing in Britain between 2018 and 2023.

Finally, as we're truly in winter now, if you're struggling to keep up with your energy bills and are with British Gas, you might be interested in the company's Energy Support Fund. The fund offers support of up to £2,000 this winter if you have energy debt on your pre-payment meter or through your credit account. Even if you're not a British Gas customer, you might also find support from the British Gas Energy Trust, which provides those struggling with energy debt with up to £1,700 regardless of which supplier you are with. #### <u>Halkyn Mountain Cinema Update</u> Winter 2025

Hello again.


#### **Remembrance Day Services**





Welsh Water delivered an assembly to the pupils on water usage and how we could save water. The children liked participating in the demonstrations.






The assembly was followed by practical activities demonstrating how we can save water.

#### The Churches of Halkyn and Rhosesmor

St Paul's Church, Rhosesmor was built in 1874 for the increasing mining population of Rhosesmor, Pant y Go, Berth Ddu and Wern y Gaer which had previously worshipped in Northop. Much of the stone came from a quarry on the side of Moel y Gaer.

St Mary's Church, Halkyn was built two years later mainly as a church where the Duke of Westminster and his house guests in the castle could worship. Large quantities of Halkyn marble were used in the erection of this building. It replaced the old church which was in the grounds of Halkyn Castle.

St Paul's church was built at a cost of £1,700 whilst St Mary's cost £23,000, a big difference in cost due to the fact one was built for miners whilst the other was built to impress the aristocracy.

#### Concert at St Paul's Church, Rhosesmor – Saturday, 28<sup>th</sup> March 2026 - 7pm

After the second successful Youth Concert earlier this year it seems to have become an annual event with the next concert to be held on the 28<sup>th</sup> March 2026. As usual we will be giving young musicians living in, or connected to the local area, the opportunity to perform in a warm and friendly environment. If you know any young musician, playing any instrument, or singers, solo or performing with others, we would like to hear from you as soon as possible. We are not expecting perfection, we are more interested in enthusiasm and commitment. #### **Holly and Ivy: Nature and Winter Traditions**

Holly, (Celyn, Ilex aquifolium) is an uncommon tree on Halkyn Mountain, unlike elsewhere. It is recognised by its evergreen glossy leaves which have sharp spines on the edges; these are thought to deter browsing animals. Higher up the tree you may notice that those leaves are often spineless. Have you ever wondered why some Holly trees never have berries? Holly trees





are dioecious, meaning that there are separate male and female trees. The sweet-smelling white flowers start to appear in May and are attractive to flying insects looking for pollen from the male trees, and nectar from the female ones. Only the female tree produces the red berries which are an important food for birds, especially winter visitors such as Fieldfares and Redwings.

#### **Holly Berries & Leaves**

Ivy (Eiddew, Hedera helix) is naturally a woodland plant and is also uncommon on Halkyn Mountain. It has two growth forms; one sends shoots along the ground and the other is a woody climber, both forms have 3/5-lobed leaves. The climbing form grows fine roots which secrete 'glue', sticking them to support structures. Ivy uses its own roots in the soil for nutrition and does no harm to trees but its weight can

overwhelm weak trees. Climbing Ivy spirals upwards seeking light, only then will it produce flowers on stout shoots of oval leaves. The pungent-smelling yellow-green flowers appear in September and are a late food source for insects. In November, berries ripen to blue-black and are a nutritious winter food for birds such as Thrushes and Blackbirds. The tangled stems of Ivy offer shelter to bats, small mammals and birds.

"The Holly and the Ivy" is a popular Christmas Carol, the lyrics of which have been known since medieval times but were not published until the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. The melody we know today was collected in Gloucestershire, in 1909 by Cecil Sharp, an English folk song collector. The words of the Carol are symbolic, more suitable as an Easter song, referring to the 'Crown of Thorns' worn by Jesus Christ at his Crucifixion; the spiny leaves and red berries represent his suffering and bloodshed to save the world. Clinging Ivy represents the Virgin Mary devoted to God and her son Jesus.

Before Christianity, Holly and Ivy were long associated with Pagan traditions, such as those celebrating the Winter Solstice. Being evergreen, they were also thought to symbolise rebirth, the return of the light and the greening of the landscape in spring. Howling winter winds were thought to be ghosts and demons, people decorated their houses with Holly and Ivy to ward off these evil spirits. Decorative carvings, depicting Holly and Ivy, are to be found in churches dating from medieval times, showing that some Pagan values had become incorporated into Christianity.

him still in Manchester Airport. Luckily the farm was still in one piece, you'll be pleased to know, I had no more disasters. August was hot and dry but the cattle and lambs continued to thrive and grow, but by the end of the month rain was desperately needed as the grass was disappearing fast.

Wendy and I had a week away in mid-August to visit friends in North Yorkshire and we also ventured across the Wolds to East Yorkshire. To my amazement the harvest was completed by the 10<sup>th</sup> August, another consequence of the dry warm summer. A huge downside of the drought conditions materialised itself a few days later with huge moor and woodland fires just a few miles south of Whitby. I have always been a strong believer that moorlands need to be managed, but by the people who live and work there and not by so called environmentalists who have just left university and are still wet behind the ears. Small areas need to be controlled every eight or nine years to maintain young green areas that will break the fire. Locally I can see bracken and scrub building up in Berth Ddu and other areas around the mountain.

Another environmental topic that touched a nerve was people complaining about the low level of water in the rivers. We were in a drought situation and if there is no rain, no water gets in the rivers. We can't spare any water from the reservoirs because public demand for tap water is growing all the time. It is therefore obvious that rivers run low and any pollution, whether it is domestic, agricultural or road and industrial run off isn't diluted.

In September your 'farmer and his wife' went on tour. Having been asked to be at Amsterdam airport at 10am on 9<sup>th</sup> September, we travelled a long way around and flew to Copenhagen on 2<sup>nd</sup> September. We saw the sights in Copenhagen and journeyed by bus across the Oresund Bridge and tunnel to Malmo in Sweden. What a fantastic piece of engineering the bridge is. After returning to Denmark, we ventured by train to Hamburg taking in scenery, farming practices and another engineering feat. As we left one station, our train started rising uphill and into a corkscrew type track until we were looking down on the rooftops, almost like taking off in an aeroplane. Next thing, we were on a bridge crossing the Kiel canal which ships use to cut miles off their journey to travel

from the Baltic to the North Sea.

In the fields we hardly saw any animals but plenty of maize about so we can only assume the cattle are kept inside all the time. Not a hill in sight was another constant observation we made.

From Hamburg having seen the sights, another train, this time to Amsterdam. Fields through the Netherlands are as flat as a bowling green, and I'm not exaggerating. A lot of land is reclaimed from the sea and is intersected by drainage canals at regular intervals. We saw quite a lot of vegetables and plants growing in the fields on that leg of the journey.

Two nights in Amsterdam, and then a half hour train ride to our rendezvous at Schiphol Airport to meet our daughter, her husband David with their two dogs in tow. They were starting a new phase of their lives moving from the Netherlands to East Virginia for three years. We helped get the dogs and the luggage through the airport. The dogs travelled in the hold of the aeroplane they were flying on and were reunited again in Washington when their dogs came out on the luggage carousel.

We then brought their car home via the overnight ferry from Rotterdam to Hull. I did the whole trip without one paper ticket, everything was on the phone. Not bad for an olden. When we unpacked for our first night our all singing, all dancing, multipronged adapter for our phone charger fell into several bits. Luckily, we soon bought a new one for a few euros.

Since we got back some rain has come and we've made a bit more silage to replace that we had to use in August. Most of the lambs have been sold and the tups are back with the ewes, hopefully making babies.

Now at the end of October the temperature has dropped and the nights are drawing in. There's still plenty of grass, and the cattle are still in the fields. As far as I'm concerned, the winter has already been shortened by a month.

#### The Dee Estuary

The Dee Estuary is one of the most important estuaries in the UK for wildlife. It is recognised across the world for the part it plays in wildlife habitat. Over 120,000 waterfowl visit the estuary in a year and is internationally important for seven species. Otters, mink and seals are seen in the waters. It has worldwide importance for Atlantic salmon, freshwater pearl mussels and the European otter.

#### **Councillor's Update – Winter 2025**

It's been encouraging to see road crews hard at work across the ward in recent months, repairing many of the potholes and fully resurfacing areas too damaged to patch. Most of our local roads are now in good condition and ready for the winter months ahead. However, I'm aware that the **Halkyn to Rhes-y-Cae road** remains in a particularly poor state. I want to reassure residents that I'm continuing to press for funding to have this stretch properly repaired as soon as possible.

On a different note, I'm very proud to share that I recently tabled and successfully passed a motion at Flintshire County Council calling for support of **automatic prostate cancer testing for men over 50**. Prostate cancer remains one of the biggest killers of men. Yet current testing is only offered when symptoms appear — often not until **stage 3**, when treatment options are more limited and outcomes are sadly much poorer.

If detected early, at **stage 1**, the survival rate is almost 100% over ten years. However, that figure drops to around **18%** when diagnosis doesn't occur until **stage 4**. Following the unanimous passing of this motion, Flintshire County Council has now written to the Health Minister urging that a national screening programme be introduced across Wales. This could quite literally save lives, and I'll continue to advocate for its implementation. If you are over 50 and haven't had a test, I would urge you to speak to your GP to arrange one. A simple blood test could save your life.

As a councillor, difficult and often emotive, issues, do cross my desk from time to time. One such case this summer was the application to convert a residential property in **Calcoed** into a children's home. I can honestly say it was one of the matters that generated the most contact from residents during my time in office.

While I fully recognise the importance of providing safe, supportive accommodation for children in need of care, after listening carefully to local voices and reviewing the circumstances, I came to the conclusion that this particular location was not ideal. Calcoed is primarily a retirement community, and many residents felt that the proposal was out of character with the area. I referred the matter to the planning committee so that residents could express their concerns directly, and I spoke at length about the correspondence I had received.

Ultimately, the committee decided to approve the application, despite the objections raised. Although this wasn't the outcome many hoped for, I am confident that our community will, in time, extend a warm welcome to the children and staff who will soon call Calcoed home.

Another key issue I'll be keeping a close eye on is the **Cemex quarry expansion**. My initial observations suggest that the extension will have minimal additional impact beyond the current level of disruption, but I remain alert to any potential concerns. If you live nearby and notice any issues, or have feedback regarding the new boundaries, please do not hesitate to get in touch. Your input helps ensure that local voices remain central in these discussions.

As we move into the festive season, I know many of us are looking forward to Christmas across the mountain. There's plenty to look forward to — from community church services to the ever-popular Brynford Christmas Tractor Run. If you've never seen it before, make sure to visit **Brynford Village Green on 5th December** for a real treat. Local farmers decorate their tractors with twinkling lights and drive through the village — a magical sight that delights both children and adults alike.

Finally, I want to take this opportunity to wish everyone a **Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year**. Whatever your beliefs or traditions, I hope this festive season brings you joy, rest, and time spent with loved ones.

Flintshire County Council Highways will complete a survey to ascertain if the area in The Nant reaches the criteria for yellow lines. The County have a lengthy list of areas to survey and this request will be placed on file at the present time.

#### Concerns with Number of Road Traffic Incidents & Injuries on A55:

Councillor Brian Coleclough expressed his concerns with the high number of accidents that are occurring on the A55 in the area of The Nant and Pentre Halkyn, in general. A number of the accidents have resulted in the attendance of the emergency services, including the air ambulance. Media reports state that there have been serious injuries. These accidents not only block the A55, with traffic being gridlocked in the immediate area, but also cause congestion in the surrounding lanes as traffic seek a detour. Councillor Coleclough wished Mr Ken Skates MS, the Welsh Government Cabinet Secretary for Transport and North Wales, to attend a site meeting. County Councillor Simon Jones agreed to make the arrangements for a site meeting.

#### Children's Play Area in Rhes Y Cae:

The Community Council have provided the sum of £5,000.00 towards a scheme to upgrade the children's play area in Rhes-Y-Cae. The work on equipment and additional safety aspects, has been completed at a cost of £10,000.00, with Flintshire County Council providing the other £5,000.00.

#### **Children's Summer Play Scheme in Rhosesmor:**

The Halkyn Community Councillors were pleased to receive the 2025 Summer Play Scheme report, which highlighted that a total of 305 attendances had been recorded over the six week period of the play scheme. The cost of the scheme was £4,406.40, with the Community Council agreeing to a 2026 Summer Play Scheme at a cost of £5,067.36 - an increase of £660.96.

#### Flintshire County Council (Street Scene):

The following concerns have been reported to Street Scene: (1) Cattle grid on B5123 road in Berth Ddu – is again rattling (2) Invasive plant known as Himalayan balsam is growing on the roadside near to the Nant Chapel, The Nant.

We still need a lot more children to join our ranks to enable us to move forward. Children between the ages of 5 and 14 are more than welcome to join us when we begin our indoor training at Holywell Leisure Centre on 18th January at 12 noon. As previously mentioned, we need to build numbers to enable our senior team to progress into the Premier League, but we have a real lack of children here at the moment. We offer full training from ECB accredited coaches for boys and girls from the ages of 5 and upwards, with junior matches guaranteed for all players who wish to play. We welcome all children, of any ability or age, who want to learn to play cricket in a fun way. It costs very little.

There is no better way to spend a few hours than playing or even watching cricket. Initially, people might think that it appears boring, but once you understand the basic rules, it can quickly become addictive, and unlike football, you are not out in the wet weather. It gets people out into the fresh air and children away from the television and games consoles for a few hours.

We believe that the first step should be enjoyment and an understanding of the game. For next season, we will once again enrol in the ECB's All Stars Cricket, which is targeted at children between 5 and 8 years of age. This is an introduction before they get to the under-9 age groups where they will then be able to play games, if they wish, against other clubs on a festival basis. Then, at under-11 age group, they switch to play hardball cricket in a league. We are also looking at building up our under-13 and under-15s age groups, to enable us to join the junior league, and for the seniors to stay at least in division 1. All protective equipment and playing kit is provided. We welcome children of all abilities, and they will be guaranteed a junior game at the weekend. Unlike some clubs it does not cost an arm and a leg, with free weekly training sessions, and next season we will be offering free membership to all juniors 15 years and under.
